## Holman Named To LGH Post Plan Of Administrative Assoc. Hynes PTC Karnival

Ernest Holman has been named administrative associate of the medical director of Lutheran General Hospital. One of his duties will be to coordinate the Medical Mission program recently initiated by the Lutheran Institute of Human Ecology, Park Ridge.

Holman worked with the Lutheran Medical program in Tanzania, East Africa, from 1961-66. He established a governing board to coordinate the work of 15 Lutheran hospitals in that country. Last year he organized a similar program in the Republic of South Africa.

A 1953 graduate of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn., Holman received a masters degree in hospital administration from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis. He lives in Mount Prospect with his wife and two children, Ingrid, 6 and Erick, 3.

The Medical Mission program reflects the efforts of the Lutheran Institute of Human Ecology to establish closer relations with mission medical facilities and programs in the developing nations of the world. As members of the Institute, Lutheran General Hospital, Lutheran Medical Center in Brooklyn, N.Y., and the new Lutheran South hospital in Matteson will participate in this program.

"The traditional forms of overseas mission medicine are rapidly changing," said Holman. "Mission medicine is confronted with the need to critically review its services on all levels. Coupled with continuing and increased demands, it faces the massive problems of inadequate financing, acute shortages of professional medical staff and the need to develop stronger ties with professional resources in the United States and Europe."

"The Institute and its member corporations feel it is part of their obligation to assist in the development of close relationships with overseas medical directions and forms of mission medicine," Holman explained.

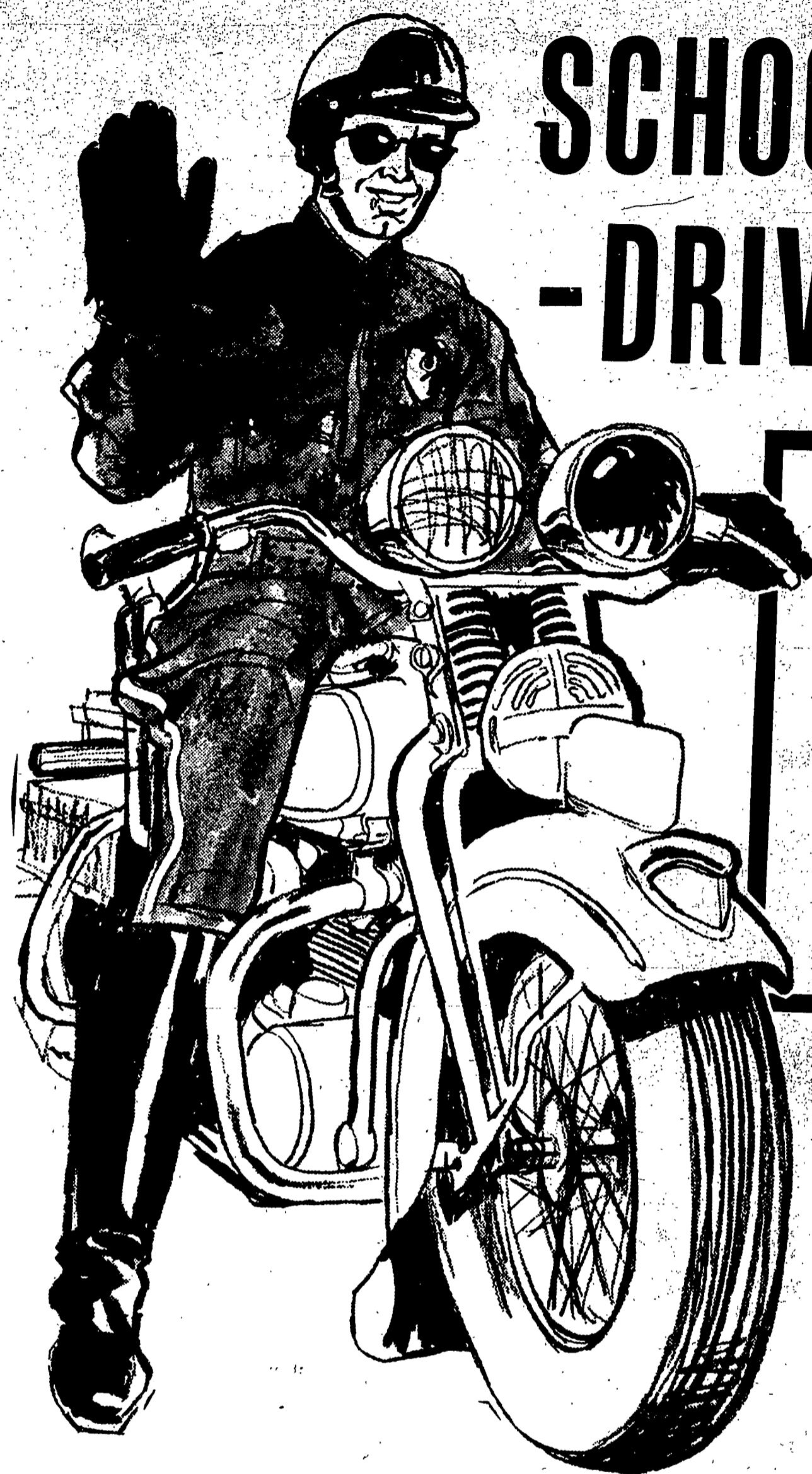

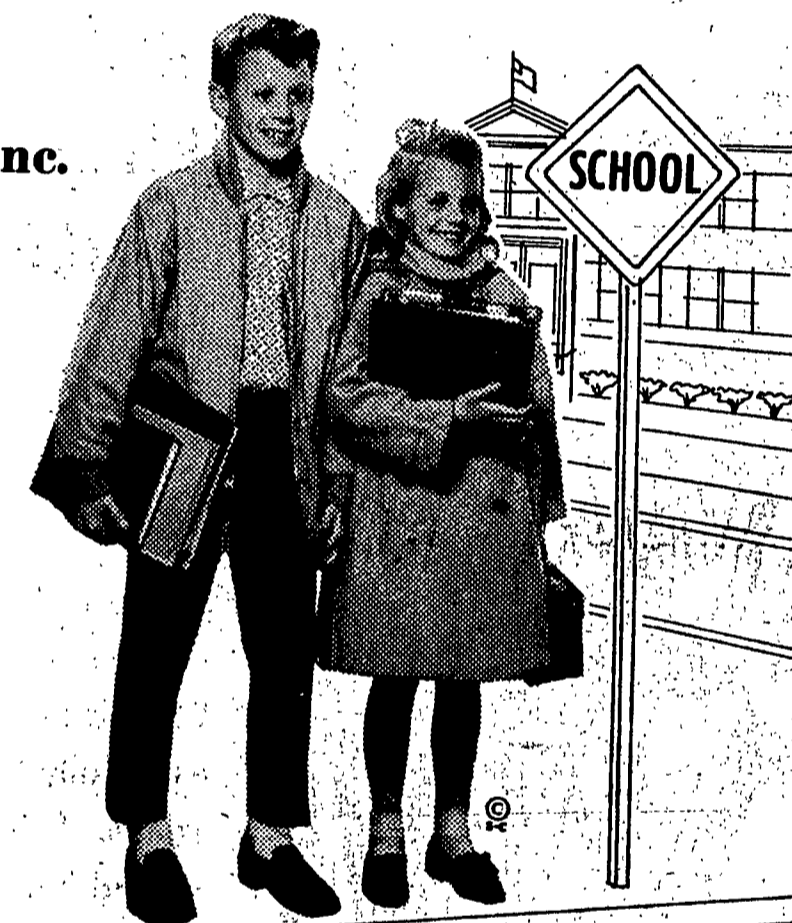

Fifteen congregations in Chicago and the suburban area will attend the final of the 1968 conventions. The location of the assembly will be announced later.

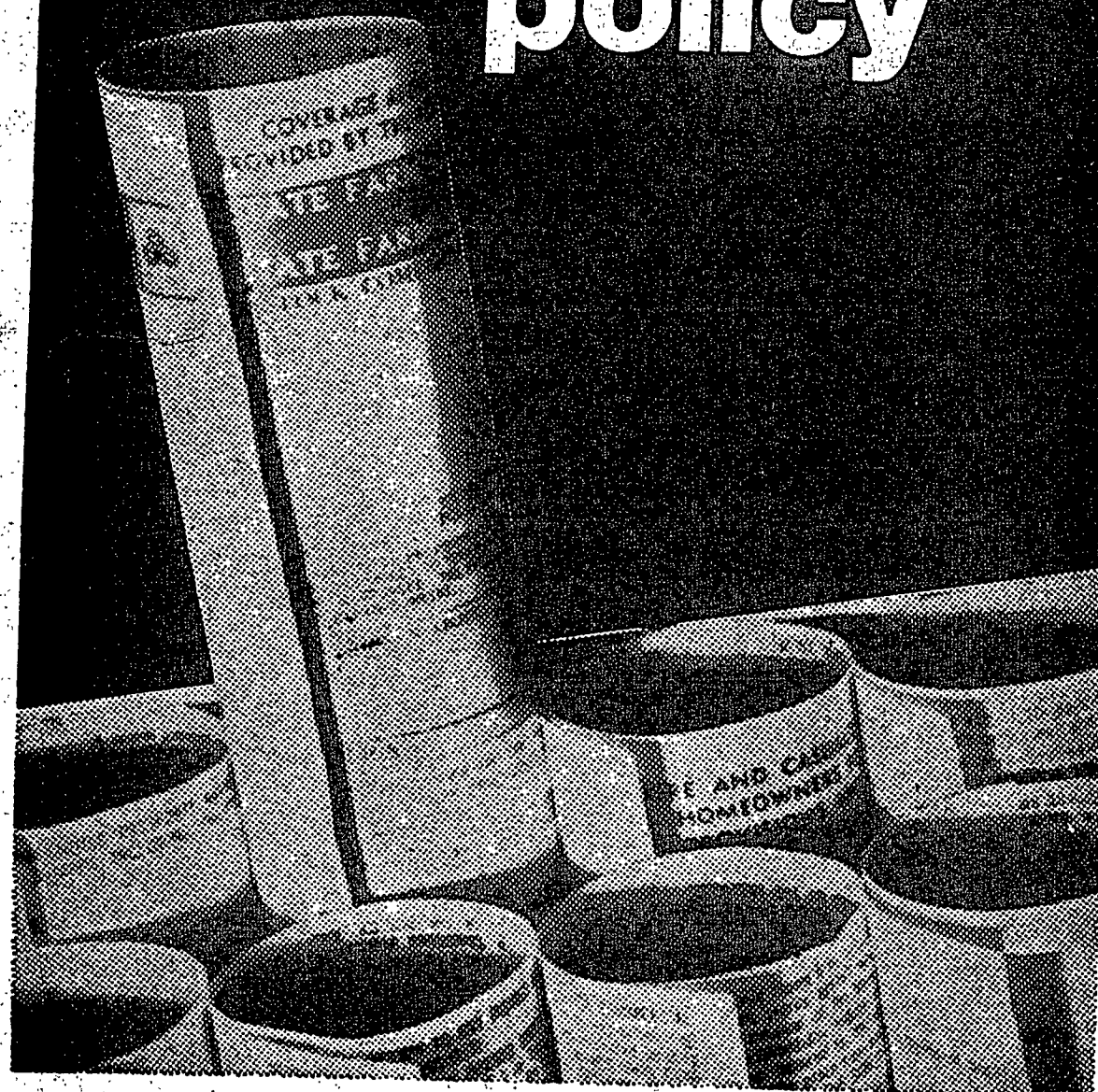

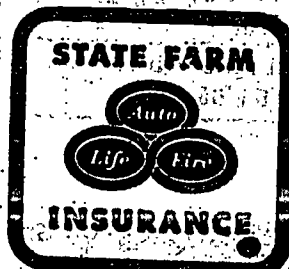
