# **Strokes and mini**strokes on the rise

According to researchers at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., there were 751,000 strokes in the

million people. The American Heart Association estimates about 600,000 new and recurrent strokes occur in Americans each year. That figure does not count TIAs.

"When we applied our findings to 1999 estimated Census data, we found about 1.2 million strokes or TIAs occur in Americans each year - and that's a conservative estimate," says the study's lead author, Robert D. Using population data from Rochester - an important source of health information for several decades - investigators found stroke incidence hadn't changed over the past 15 years, suggesting pereviously published numbers of strokes per year may be too low

Incidence is the number of new cases of a disease that develop in a population during a specific time period, usually a year.

Mayo Clinic reseachers have collected detailed health data regarding stroke in residents of Rochester that have occurred since 1935. Brown says that data show a decline in stroke incidence from the 1960s until the mid-1970s when the decline began to level off. The largest research shows that not only is the incidence of stroke in Rochester no longer declining, but is actually slightly higher than 10 to 15 years ago.

Examining data from 1990 through 1994, Brown's group found the total incidence of all stroke types - including first, second, and all subsequent strokes occurring in Rochester residents during the five-year period - was 256 per 100,000 each year.

When Brown and his team added together the number of strokes and the and the number of TIAs, they calculated it to be an incidence of 481 per 100,000 per

Counting TIAs is difficult, say the investigators, because the symptoms - such as weakness or numbness - are variable and re

sometimes ignored by patients. "When we cite incidence rates, we are referring to the first lifetime event of that particular type, such as a first stroke or a first heart attack," says Brown. "To obtain a better estimate of the overall burden of a disease in the population, it is important to consider second, third, and other recurrent events. Those recurrent result in significant health care expenditures, and greatly increases the burden of the disease." Brown's group used data from Rochester and added to research by Dr. Joseph Broderick of the



# Diversification Can Help Protect You From Sudden "Slumps"

Technology has been the word for some investors over the past couple of years. But when tech stocks short-circuited in the spring of 2000, investors whose portfolios weren't well-diversified learned a hard lesson. Some investors mistakenly believed the technology sector had unlimited growth potential. But when it fell, it fell hard. The Nasdaq Composite Index, home to many technology stocks, dropped 13 percent in the second quarter of the year -- its largest drop in a decade.

Then, in July, the Nasdaq fell another 10 percent. Market experts attribute this rapid decline to several factors. For one thing, many technology stocks had become tremendously ex-

pensive -- too expensive for investors' liking. Also, investors began to get nervous over the lack of earnings exhibited by many of the dot.com companies.

The reasons behind the market meltdown are actually less important than the fact that some people had large percentages of their portfolios tied up with technology stocks. As a result, they got burned. Were these people foolish to put their investment dollars in technology stocks? Not necessarily. Several areas of technology offer at-

tractive prospects for growth. However, too many people put too much money in technology, leaving themselves over-exposed to just one sector -- and that's an invitation to trouble. It's never a good idea to put a large majority of your investment dollars into one particular market segment, no matter how strong it may look at a given time. As the events of this past spring showed, it takes very little time for a soaring market to plunge.

Sometimes, you can become over-concentrated in one area without even being aware of it. For example, rapid or sustained growth in the total value of a particular group of stocks can contribute to "unbalancing" a portfolio. That's why it's important to periodically review your holdings and, if necessary, "rebalance" your portfolio. If you're too heavily weighted in an area, think about ways you can diversify. By spreading your dollars across many different industries and types of invest-

ments, you'll reduce the risk of having most of your assets exposed to a sudden downturn in one area. And, by having your money invested in a variety of areas, you'll have more chances to take advantage of upswings. Furthermore, you can diversify in more ways than one. First, of course, you can invest in different industries. Then, you can invest in different types of companies within each industry. Some industries may offer you more investment possibilities than others, but all industries will give you some choices. And striving for maximum diversification is generally a good idea.

There's not much "sizzle" in diversification; it's a basic, common-sense approach to investing. The district's decision evidently came as a surprise to village officials. Code Enforcement Director Chuck Ostman had just told the board that at an earlier meeting with representatives from Dist. 63 there did not seem to be an objection to the gas station, while Mayor Nicholas Blase cited a letter received from Superintendent Dr. Kathleen Williams giving "every indication" that the school board would agree to the measure.

The board was deciding whether to proceed with a vote when word came from Dist. 63 that approval had not been given.

"On the one hand, the superintendent told me they did not object, but apparently when the public was present, they changed their minds," he said.

The petitioner, Vitas Maciukevicius of W T Engineering Inc., urged the board to continue with the vote. He said that he did not believe the district's concerns were unfounded, but that exposure to fumes was unlikely and routing adjstments had been made for buses to minimize traffic impact.

While the village does not need permission from the district to pass the measure, the Niles Board was obviously uncomfortable with proceeding without district approval.

Mayor Blase recommended that due to the closeness of the district's vote, the petitioner ask the Niles Board for a continuance in order to give the engineer time to further negotiate with Dist. 63.
