Hid Out During War

The Loch Ness sea serpent, first seen in 1933, made his last public appearance in 1943. He hid out during the war after a group of pub-room admirals proposed of pub-room admirals propose that the British Navy capture him and train him to hunt down Ger-

man submarines. Considering this draft-dodging record, therefore, it must be as-sumed that the Lake Como giant is a newcomer, for the "sweet-heart of Loch Ness" was a shy sea serpent who never raised his tail in anger. Certainly the big sissy wouldn't charge full tilt into several boats full of brawny fisher-folk. Many cynics believe the "great

sea serpent" is as mythical as ogres, rocs, unicorns, the flying Dutchman, the phoenix, or the well-known bald-headed man with dandruff. Scientists Not So Cocksure

The scientists aren't so cock-ure. Some say there still may exist in the ocean's watery wastes a few of the great prehistoric rep tiles, or, more plausibly, a scar modern kind of gigantic sea snak still unclassified. "Remote though it may be i

the background," cautions the con-servative Encyclopedia Britan-nica, "it is still unwise to deny the existence of the sea-serpent." Which may be some consolation to Lake Como's interpid fishermen -if they can read English as well as they can see sea serpents.
