No Intervention Says Dickinson

Secretary of War Declares Troops Will Not Cross Into Mexico

NEW YORK, Mar. 13.—Secretary of War Dickinson, who was to have left today for Panama, via Colon, to inspect the canal work, deferred his departure to settle some differences between the Panama railroad and steamships. In a statement given out here, he declares that he does not believe the United States troops will enter Mexico, and that there is no excuse for intervention on the part of Uncle Sam, at the present time.

HOUSE COMMITTEE INSPECTS FILIPINO CAMPS; CHAIRMAN SAYS IMMIGRANTS ARE O. K.

Rapid but thorough inspection of the Filipino camps at various plantations of the island was made yesterday by the House Committee on Immigration and Agriculture. Under the leadership of Chairman Ed Towse, the committee took an automobile yesterday, and after a complete circuit of the island and a lunch at Haleiwa, returned last evening.

"That the Filipinos are not 'undesirable citizens,' and that if properly looked after they become valuable plantation laborers, is the conclusion reached by Chairman Towse, and it is probable that the committee report will not condemn the importation of the 'little brown brothers' by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association. Towse said today that the reports made to the committee by plantation managers and policemen and by the laborers themselves prove that under proper conditions they make good laborers, are not disorderly, and not uncleanly."

"The first inspection was made at Kahuku plantation," said Towse today. The quarters there are fine. The houses are models, better than they would have in Honolulu. There are about 150 men and twenty-five women. At first most of the women worked in the fields; now only a few do so. All the Filipinos here were in good physical condition, and Manager Adams described them to us as good laborers."

"We visited Honolulu plantation at Waipahu on the way back to the city. We took them here entirely unprepared for our visit. All of the managers we questioned gave the Filipinos a good camp."

DECIDE WOMAN CHOLERA VICTIM

The conclusion that the aged woman who succumbed at the Kalia quarantine station yesterday was a victim of cholera and the development of two suspected and mild cases of the disease at the station were the developments reported by the Board of Health today.

The physicians of the Board of Health are against the theory that the case of the woman points to a new center of infection, but believe that this last case can be traced to one of the old cases.

The figures now show twenty-nine cases of the disease and twenty-two deaths, there being six cases under treatment at Kalia.

BELIEVES MEXICO IS EQUAL TO OCCASION

(Special Bulletin Cable.) LONDON, Mar. 13.—Foreign Secretary Wood stated today, in the House of Commons, that there was no reason to believe that the British interests in Mexico were endangered or that the Mexican authorities were unable to protect them.

Clemons, the new United States District Judge will not be disqualified from sitting in the condemnation proceedings.

KAUAI BRANCH OF BISHOP & CO.

## LAW-MAKERS SEE WAIALEE SCHOOL

Many Declare That Appropriation Is None Too Much.

What is most urgently needed at the Waialeale Boys' Industrial School is \$20,000. This amount should be appropriated by the Legislature for the maintenance of the school, which is doing much good to the community, not only in the educating of its pupils, but in the inculcating of character and good citizenship. Such in brief is the unofficial sentiment of members of the Legislature.

Yesterday the members of the two branches of the Legislature visited the school, in company with Superintendent W. T. Pope of the Department of Public Instruction and School Inspector T. H. Gibson. Headed by E. C. Long, chairman of the education committee, the members gathered at the railroad depot in the morning and departed shortly after 8:30 o'clock for Waialeale. On arriving there they were greeted by H. M. Tucker, the superintendent. The school band, under the leadership of John Kauoho, played selections for the visitors.

After visiting the campus, the buildings, dairy, pumping station and vegetable gardens, the solons were invited to a luncheon which was prepared by the boys under the superintendence of their teachers.

### Legislators Favor Good Sum.

The lawmakers took much interest and care in sizing up the situation, and expressed themselves in favor of making substantial appropriations for its maintenance. Judging from the expressions of those who were interviewed, it is safe to say that they will support the appropriation of \$20,000 when it is properly presented to the Legislature by the education and finance committee.

That the present school buildings are not large enough to accommodate the pupils of the Waialeale school with comfort is the general opinion of the legislators. They were shown the dormitories, the hospital room, the dining room, kitchen, pantry, and the out-houses. They found that the accommodations are altogether too small. The present schoolroom, according to the superintendent's report, is needed for a dining room.

In many parts of the dormitory evidences of decay of the building were clearly in view. During the rainy season, water poured into the sleeping apartments freely. The boys had to do their best to patch up the leaks. The floors of the building need repairing and painting.

One of the greatest necessities today is the construction of another building, with dormitories above and large assembly hall below. The present schoolroom has become too small owing to increase of the number of pupils.

The engine-room and equipment are too small, according to the superintendent. In place of a steam engine, it is proposed to obtain a gasoline engine. This is considered more effective.

### Medical Services Needed.

The other things which are needed most are telephone and medical services. There is no telephone at the school, and hence cases of emergency can not be reported to the authorities at proper time. Medical attendance is badly needed, also the services of a dentist.

The two patches came in for inspection. Unlike the Chinese taro planters, the boys at Waialeale plant the taro according to the ancient Hawaiian style. The taro experts among the legislators were much pleased. Potatoes, bananas and other vegetables raised on the grounds are declared to be the best in that section of the island.

The present estimate of maintaining the boys at the school, according to the report, is \$9,329 per boy per day,

or \$17,882.91 for all the boys during the year 1909-10.

The school intends to fence the mauka land in order to prevent the cattle and animals from trespassing on the school grounds. This, of course, requires money to meet the expenditures.

During the luncheon yesterday in the dining room, where Superintendent Tucker had arranged things for the guests, W. T. Rayburn, Assistant United States District Attorney, urged the legislators to vote for appropriations which will help the school materially in the future. At the end of his talk, the lawmakers expressed themselves in favor of supporting the bill when presented in the two houses. Rev. S. L. Desha, chaplain of the House, also made a strong talk. Chairman Long of the education committee is in favor of providing sufficient funds for the maintenance of the school. The party returned to town in the afternoon.

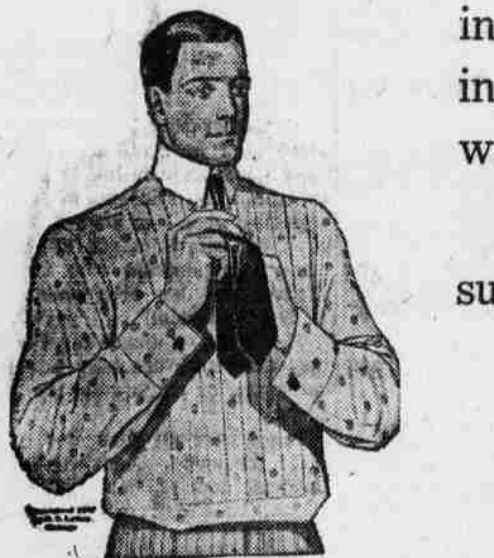

## MOTHER OF THE PRINCESS DEAD

Mrs. Muiolo Keawehenu, the mother of Princess Kahaniana'ohle, died last Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Panaluan, Waikiki, at the age of sixty-five. She was born in Makawao, Maui, where she received her education in the Hawaiian schools. She was well known throughout the islands.

The funeral arrangements will be deferred until the return of Prince Kahaniana'ohle, who is expected in the *Matsuo* liner *Lurline*, next Thursday morning.

## HAWAII PHONE MEN CONFER

### Seek Means to Defeat Non-Subscribers Use of Telephones.

(Special Bulletin Correspondence.)  
HILO, March 1.—The heads of all the four telephone companies on this island, Richards of Hilo, Pritchard of Hamakua, Tuiloch of Kohala and August of the Kona-Kau line, met this week in Hilo, and the meeting caused the revival of the rumor which was faintly heard a short time ago, namely that certain parties were going to ask the legislature for a franchise for a new telephone company, which would install an automatic switchboard and include the entire island in its operations.

It was generally reported that this matter furnished the cause for the conference of the phone powers, but this is definitely denied by the gentlemen concerned.

Pritchard stated that when he recently visited Honolulu, just before the opening of the session of the legislature, he had heard that certain parties, the names of whom he did not know, intended to seek a telephone franchise for this island from the legislature, but, said Pritchard, emphatically, this question had nothing whatever to do with the conference of himself and the other phone company managers, which was, as a matter of fact, merely one of their usual periodical conferences, held in order to discuss ways and means with which to effect a general improvement of the telephone service all around the island. Pritchard stated that it would take at least \$300,000 to duplicate the telephone equipment which the island now possessed, and he did not for a minute believe that any new company would go into such an expense.

E. E. Richards confirmed what Pritchard had said. He said that he knew nothing about the reported attempt to get a franchise, nor did this matter have the slightest connection with the conference, which had been called in order that the service might be improved, and, as a matter of fact, it had been decided to make several improvements, mainly in the outside districts, which would, when completed, vastly improve the long-distance service.

The telephone men also discussed the problem presented by the prevalence of the non-subscriber, a phenomenon which the telephone men dread like the farmers dread the cutworm. The non-subscriber, they say, takes at least one-third of the company's service, and, particularly where he uses the long-distance lines, he is taking a lot of time which really belongs to the subscribers. If the non-subscribers could be kept off the line a much better service could be given the subscribers. No solution has, however, as yet been found to stop this trouble, but the subscribers will be asked, for their own benefit, to assist the company in keeping out those persons who make a chronic use of other people's instruments.

# CONTEST PLAN A COMBINATION

## TRIPPERS WRITE IN REGARD TO ROUTES

### Outside Island Nominations Came In By The Mauna Kea Mail Saturday.

The first outside island nominations for the Evening Bulletin's Ten-Trip Travel Contest, which starts on Tuesday, March 28, were received by the Mauna Kea mail Saturday. Among the nominations are a fair proportion of school teachers of either sex, and a number of boys and girls who want mainland trips.

**Not Many Questions.**  
Contest nominations this year are not accompanied by questions of doubt, as has sometimes been the case in past years. Readers of the Bulletin have learned that trips are always given as promised. The number of work in this contest are proportionately small. The contest plan is a simple one, and the prospective trip travelers have grasped that the first thing essential is to get their nominations made and then watch the Bulletin for further contest information.

**Counting on Long Trips.**  
Some of the trippers-to-be are counting on the northern and southern round trip across the States, if they are fortunate enough to secure one of the longer trips. By this route a complete circle of the United States is made. When leaving San Francisco they may choose their different routes. If they wish, they may go by Los Angeles, through Texas and other Southern States to New Orleans, and from there to New York and back by the northern route through Chicago, west to Portland, and then to San Francisco. Of course, these trips are dependent on what trips the candidates earn, but the point is that the Bulletin will make every concession possible to the fortunate trippers in the selection of their routes. There will be no selected railroad routes. The candidates will, when they earn the additional mileage, travel where and when they choose.

**Trips Transferable.**  
They can remain in San Francisco

if they do not want to take the longer trips, and receive the equivalent of the extra mileage in hotel accommodations.

The trips when earned will be of specific value, and the trip owner can easily transfer one for anything they would like better than a trip.

**Vacation and Contest Trip Plan Combined.**  
Subscription contests are a yearly event in larger cities, where the most prominent dailies offer prizes for popular people, but the Evening Bulletin is the first newspaper that has devised a contest plan that makes certain the reward of every worker in just proportion to the amount of work they do. Such is the explanation of the additional trip offers. Candidates at a distance from Honolulu will be supplied with information concerning the various trips when they communicate with the contest man. The table will show the necessary vote totals for the trips from San Francisco to Los Angeles, New Orleans, New York, Chicago, Boston, St. Louis, Denver, Salt Lake and Portland.

**Standing Vote Schedule.**  
The vote schedule will be published at some later date, as well as the standing club offer, which, by the way, will be the only one made during the contest. More votes at a time than

another for a certain number of subscriptions will not be given this year. The vote issue as first published will be an unalterable one. "A chance for everyone" is to mean much. Not only will the contest be open for the nomination of everyone in Hawaii, excepting Bulletin employees and their close relatives, but the contest slogan is to mean that the vote issue and contest plan is the fairest one ever devised. There will be no districts pulling for or against any particular candidate, nor will there be the aid or lack of aid of a chaperone candidate. There is to be no chaperone selection.

**Liberal Vote Issue.**  
The vote issue on the daily and weekly will be liberal. And what will make every candidate's chances equal is that there will be no possible chance to gain an advantage by subscription club offers.

**One Club Offer Only.**  
The only club offer made will be a continuous one from the contest beginning until the contest end. This with the vote issue will be announced later.

## PLAYGROUND FOR SCHOOL WANTED

Plans for a public playground near the Kanihama School will be discussed tonight at a meeting of the Kanihama Improvement Club, to be held at the residence of T. J. King, beginning at 7:30 o'clock. The club, which numbers over a hundred members, is anxious for a large attendance.

According to the plans, the club wishes to get a playground opposite the school on the Pihoko street side. A breathing-place is badly needed for the pupils, it is stated.

## PLANS CAMPAIGN FOR PROMOTION

### Committee Waiting to See What Amount Legislature Will Appropriate.

A big publicity campaign is planned by the Hawaii Promotion Committee as soon as the legislature takes definite action on an appropriation for promotion purposes. The Republican platform pledges the party to look after promotion generously and the legislators are all in favor of doing so, and it is not improbable that the committee will get the \$50,000 for which it is asking.

Secretary Wood of the committee will then begin to carry out plans for giving Hawaii publicity through the San Francisco exposition work. It is probable that one or more men will be put in the exposition publicity bureau at San Francisco to get Hawaii "hoisting" literature with the exposition advertising. In order to arrange for the work, Secretary Wood plans to take a trip to San Francisco soon and get in touch with the officials there. Among the men who are connected with the exposition are a number of his friends and by being on the ground he can make arrangements in a few minutes that would take weeks by mail.

## BAKER WILL SPEAK TO MEN'S LEAGUE

"The Progressive Movement in Politics" is the subject of an address that will be made tonight by Ray Stannard Baker, the author, before the Men's League of Central Union church. The occasion is a dinner given by the Men's League, beginning at 6 o'clock.

Mr. Baker is in the Islands investigating immigration and race conditions for the American Magazine, of whose staff he is one of the most noted members. He has been making a special study of racial conditions for several years.

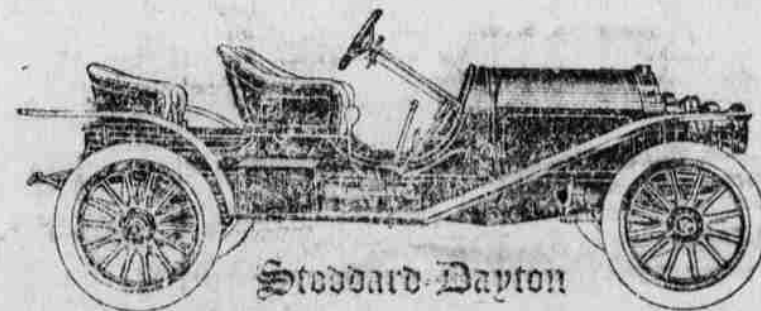

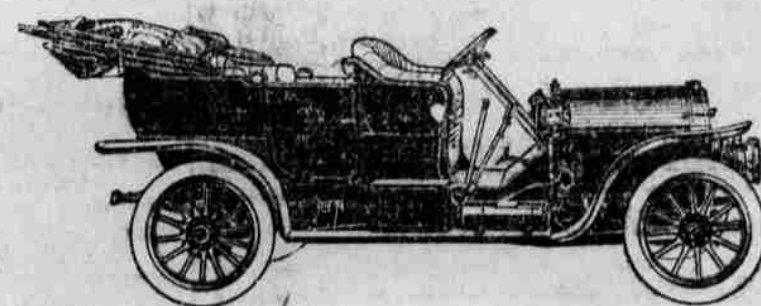
