**THE NATIONAL REGISTRATION OF ALIENS**  
 INSTRUCTIONS FOR REGISTRATION AND SPECIMEN FORM

*To Every Alien in the United States:*

A Nation-wide registration of aliens will be conducted from August 27 to December 26, 1940.

All aliens 14 years of age or older are required to register. Alien children under 14 years must be registered by their parents or guardians. Generally speaking, foreign-born persons who have not become citizens of the United States are aliens. Persons with first citizenship papers must register.

To make your registration easier, you should fill out pages 3 and 4 of this form and personally take it to the post office. *This is not the actual registration form*, but it shows the information that you must give at the post office when you register. There you will be asked to give the information indicated on these pages, to swear to (or affirm) its truth, and to be fingerprinted.

The registration of aliens is compulsory. A specific act of Congress—the Alien Registration Act of 1940—requires all aliens to register during the official registration period, August 27 to December 26, 1940. All aliens 14 years of age or over must be fingerprinted as a part of registration. A fine of \$1,000 and imprisonment for 6 months is prescribed by this law for failure to register, for refusal to be fingerprinted, or for making registration statements known to be false.

Registration is free. You should not pay anyone to register for you. It is not necessary to pay any person or group to assist you in registering. The Government, through its post offices, will assist you as much as possible. Complete instructions and the official regulations for registration may be examined at registration post offices.

The Alien Registration Act was passed so that the United States could determine exactly how many aliens there are, who they are, and where they are. Registration, including fingerprinting, will not be harmful to law-abiding aliens. All records will be kept secret and confidential and will be made available only to such persons as may be designated with the approval of the Attorney General of the United States.

Attention of all citizens as well as aliens is called to the laws of the United States which protect aliens in this country.

A receipt card will be sent to every alien who registers. This card will serve as evidence of registration.

After registration, the law requires all aliens and parents or guardians of aliens to report changes of residence address within 5 days of the change to the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Department of Justice, Washington, D. C. You can get change of address forms at post offices.

All aliens in the United States are urged to comply fully with the provisions of the Alien Registration Act of 1940.

Fill out the enclosed sample form and bring it with you to the post office when you register. Do not delay your registration. Complete it as soon as possible.

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR SPECIMEN FORM

**Item 1. Name.**—(a) Write or print your present name. (b) Give the name you used when you first arrived in the United States. (c) Give all other names by which you have been known here or abroad. If the same as 1 (a), write "Same." *For children under 14 years of age* write "Mother's maiden name ....."

**Item 2. Address.**—(a) Give the location of your residence, that is, your usual dwelling place. (b) Give post-office address. If same as 2 (a), write "Same."

**Item 3. Birthdate and birthplace.**—(a) Give birthdate in full. (b) Name the city in which or nearest to the place where you were born. Also name the province and country, as it existed at the time of your birth.

**Item 4. Foreign citizenship.**—Name the country of which you are a citizen or subject. If you have lost all foreign citizenship, write "None. Last a citizen of ....." and name the country of which you were last a citizen or subject.

**Item 5. Sex, marital status, and race.**—Show by check marks your sex, marital status, and race. If your race is not listed, write the name of your race in the space following "Other."

**Item 6. Height, weight, and color of hair and eyes.**—Enter your height in feet and inches and your weight in pounds. If you do not know the correct answers, measure and weigh yourself. Give the color of your hair (brown, red, black, gray, etc.) and the color of your eyes (brown, blue, black, etc.).

**Item 7. Entry into the United States.**—(a) Give the port or place and the date of your *last* arrival into the United States. Do not report as your last arrival any return to the United States from a visit of less than 6 months in Canada or Mexico. (b) State the name of the vessel or other means of transportation, as railroad, bus, auto, walked, etc., by which you arrived on the date given in 7 (a). (c) Show by a check how you last arrived. If none of the specified answers applies, write in the space following "Other," how you arrived. (d) Show by a check the classification under which you last entered the United States. If none of the specified answers applies, write in the space following "Other," how you entered. (e) Write the date you *first* arrived in the United States and remained for a period of 6 months or longer.

**Item 8. Residence in the United States.**—(a) Write the total number of years you have lived in the United States since your first arrival as noted in 7 (e). Do not include periods of 6 months or longer during all of which you have lived abroad. (b) Write whether you expect to remain in the United States permanently, or if temporarily, state how long you expect to stay.

**Item 9. Occupation, employer and industry.**—(a) State as your usual occupation the trade, business, or profession by which you usually earn your livelihood. For example: Tool maker, waitress, miner, etc. (b) State the trade, business, or profession in which you are at present engaged, even though it may not be your usual occupation. (c) Write the name of the company or person who employs you and his address. Also state the business or industry in which he is engaged. For example: Machine shop, restaurant, coal mine, etc. If you operate your own shop, business, or profession, enter the word "Self," your business address and the business in which you are engaged.

**Item 10. Activities.**—State your activities during the past 5 years, either in the United States or abroad, other than as shown by your statements regarding present or usual occupation. Give the approximate dates of such activities.

**Item 11. Military or naval service.**—If you have had military or naval service in any country, including the United States, enter the name of the country, the branch of service (such as Army, Navy, Marines, Air Corps, etc.) and the dates of your enlistment and discharge. For service in more than one country, list each country, branch of service and period of service. If you have had no military or naval service, write "None."

**Item 12. United States citizenship.**—State whether you have or have not applied for first citizenship papers. If you have applied for first papers, or have petitioned for naturalization, give the requested facts. *For children under 14 years of age*, state the information on citizenship for either parent who has applied for citizenship by crossing out the word "I" and writing "My father" or "My mother" and then give the facts. If neither parent has applied, cross out the word "I" and write "Neither parent has."

**Item 13. Relatives.**—If you have one or both parents, husband or wife, or children living in the United States, give the requested facts. *For children under 14 years of age* give only the information concerning parents.

**Item 14. Arrest record.**—Enter whether you have or have not been arrested, indicted, or convicted for any offense. If you have, give the nature of the offense for which you were arrested, the date, the city or town, and the State or country in which it took place, and the disposition of the case.

**Item 15. Activities for foreign government.**—Write "have" or "have not" according to the fact. If you write "have," state position held, length of time, nature of duties or activities, compensation received, and names of any such clubs, organizations, or societies. If you have been employed by any foreign government or subdivision thereof, the nature of the employment and the approximate dates should be stated.

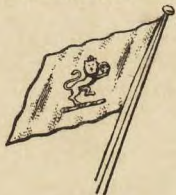

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR EXECUTING APPLICATION FOR PERMIT TO REENTER

IMPORTANT.—UNLESS THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS ARE CAREFULLY OBSERVED, FAILURE TO OBTAIN PERMIT MAY RESULT

Any alien lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, and about to depart temporarily, may apply, under Section 10 of the Immigration Act of 1924, for a permit to reenter the United States, which will establish the fact that he is returning from a temporary visit abroad. In connection with the attached application blank the following instructions are to be observed:

1. Applications must be filed APPROXIMATELY 30 DAYS PRIOR TO DEPARTURE with, and sworn to before, an immigration officer, *except* that the following classes of persons shall have their applications sworn to before a notary public and mail them direct to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D.C.:

(1) Persons of a race eligible to citizenship, who were permanently admitted on and subsequent to July 1, 1924, with consular immigration visas;

(2) Persons who have been registered under the Act of March 2, 1929; and

(3) Persons of a race eligible to citizenship who after January 1, 1932, have applied for and received permits.

2. An applicant who cannot appear in person before an immigration officer, may forward to the nearest immigration station, application accompanied by an AFFIDAVIT setting forth the reasons why personal appearance cannot be made.

3. Where provision is not made in Item 1 above, for mailing applications direct to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D.C., the head of the family may file applications for permits in behalf of a wife and minor children. Applications filed for a wife and minor children by the head of the family must be sworn to before a notary public BY THE PERSON FOR WHOM THE PERMIT IS INTENDED, before it is presented to an immigration officer by the head of the family.

4. **Application, with the exception of the signature, must be typewritten or printed.**

5. **Application, photographs, and money order must be submitted together.**

6. Signature at the end of the application should be the name now used by the applicant.

7. A separate application must be submitted by each alien, regardless of age. A permit will cover only one applicant.

8. Two individual, front-view photographs (duplicates) without a hat, 2½ by 2½ inches in size, must accompany the application. Photographs MUST BE ON THIN PAPER, and have a light background. Group photographs or snapshots will not be accepted. Photographs must be signed by the applicant on the front in such a manner as will not obscure the features, and in the presence of the officer administering the oath.

9. A fee of three dollars (\$3.00) must accompany each application. Remittance must be by postal or express money order, payable to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D.C. Cash or postage stamps will not be accepted. If two or more applications are submitted, separate remittances in the sum of three dollars (\$3.00) each must accompany each application. If a permit is refused, the fee will be returned.

10. When a permit is issued the applicant will so be advised and instructed how to proceed to obtain same.

11. **Permits will not be mailed to applicants, but can only be obtained by applicants on personal call at a designated immigration office prior to their departure from the United States.**

12. **Care should be exercised to designate the immigration office listed on the attached sheet to which it is desired to have the permit forwarded for delivery.**

### EXTENSIONS

On good cause shown, the validity of a permit may be extended for a period or periods, not exceeding six months each. The following directions must be observed:

1. **Prior to the expiration of the date of the permit**, written request must be made to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization by the person to whom the permit was issued. This request should be mailed between 30 and 60 days prior to the expiration of the permit. **Permit must accompany the application.**

2. The application must be sworn to before a consular officer of the United States.

3. Application must contain name of applicant; address in the United States; when, where, and by what means he departed from the United States; reason for such extension and purpose for which desired; and foreign address to which permit is to be returned.

4. A fee of three dollars (\$3.00) must accompany each application for extension. Remittance should be by international money order, drawn on Washington, D.C., or foreign exchange on a bank in the United States, payable to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D.C. If extension is refused, the fee will be returned with the permit. The permit itself will be returned to the foreign address given in the application, whether extension is granted or not.

5. Where the validity of the permit has expired, the alien must obtain an immigration visa from an American consul before embarking for the United States.

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NOTE.—The naturalization laws provide, among other things, that: "If an individual returns to the country of his allegiance and remains therein for a continuous period of more than six months and less than one year during the period immediately preceding the date of filing the petition for citizenship for which continuous residence is required as a condition precedent to admission to citizenship, the continuity of such residence shall be presumed to be broken, but such presumption may be overcome by the presentation of satisfactory evidence that such individual had a reasonable cause for not returning to the United States prior to the expiration of such six months. Absence from the United States for a continuous period of one year or more during the period immediately preceding the date of filing the petition for citizenship for which continuous residence is required as a condition precedent to admission to citizenship shall break the continuity of such residence."

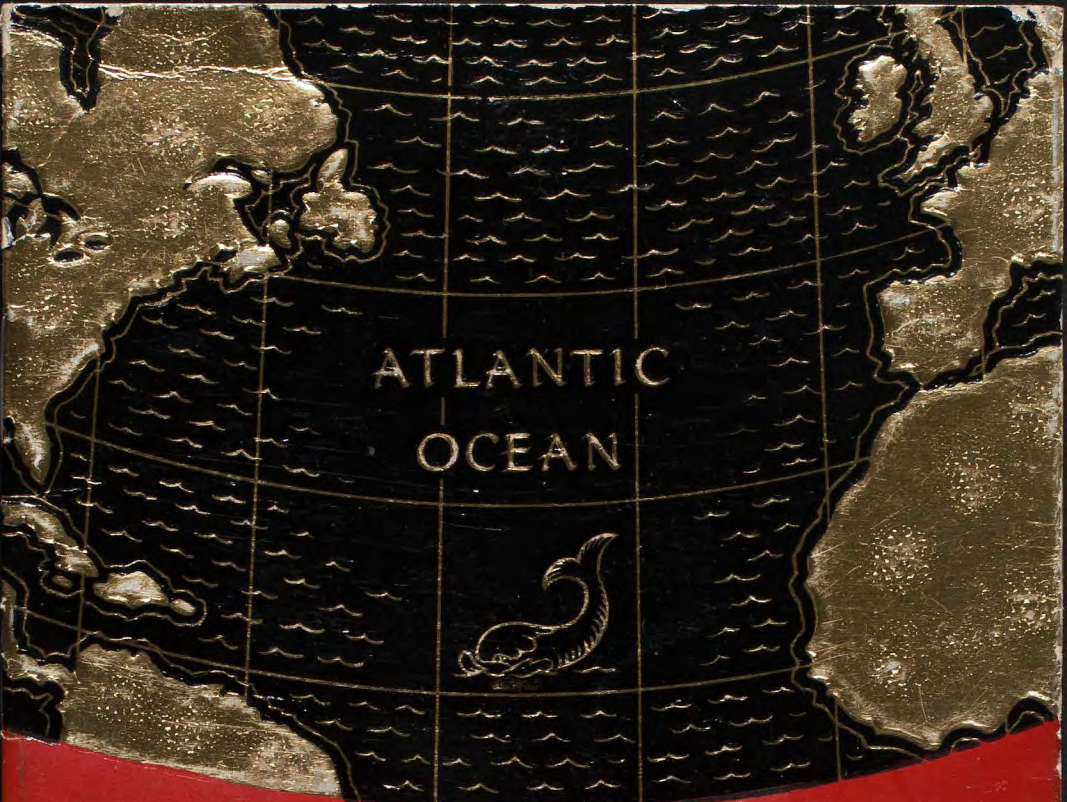

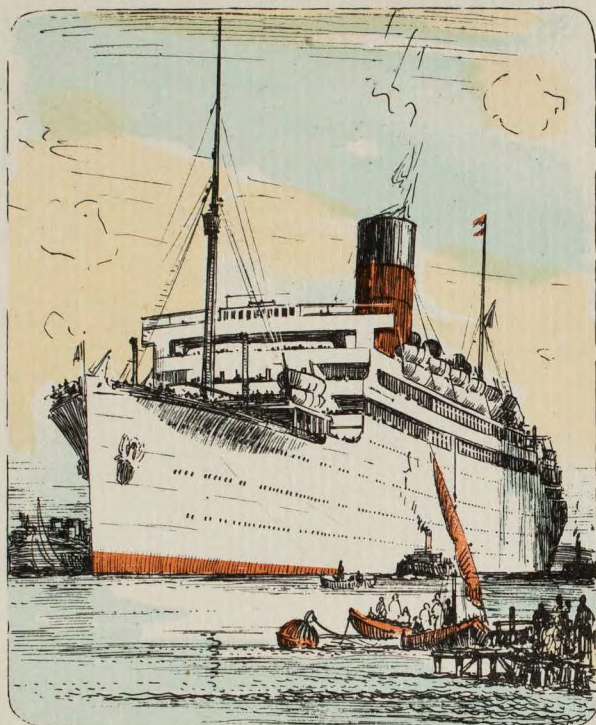

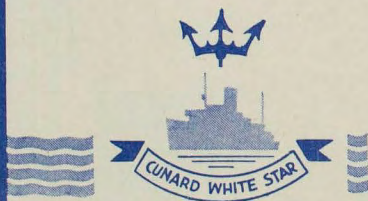

## REFUND OF UNITED STATES HEAD TAX

Under revised United States Government regulations Head Tax paid at the time of booking by passengers holding visitors' visas (Section 3, paragraph 2) is refundable only when passengers obtain from the U.S. Immigration Inspector at port of arrival a **Certificate of Exemption** confirming that they are not assessed for Head Tax.

These Certificates of Exemption are only issued to passengers who satisfy the U.S. Immigration Inspector (whose decision is final) that they do not intend to remain in the United States longer than **60 days**, and to facilitate immediate refund of Head Tax to such passengers the Purser will also furnish them with a separate receipt for Head Tax.

**Unless a Certificate of Exemption is obtained from the U.S. Immigration Inspector Head Tax cannot be refunded even though passengers eventually depart from the United States within the 60 days limit.**

**Transit Passengers** holding U.S. transit visa (Section 3, paragraph 3) who fail to satisfy the U.S. Immigration Inspector that they will depart from the United States within 60 days (thus not being able to obtain Certificate of Exemption), who have not already paid Head Tax **will be required to pay the Head Tax** to the Purser prior to disembarkation.

**Residents of Canada, Newfoundland, Cuba and Mexico** (if they for at least one year immediately preceding entry into U.S.A. have been legally domiciled in or have been bona fide residents in one of these countries) are exempt from Head Tax when they enter the U.S.A. for a temporary period not exceeding one year.

## GENERAL INFORMATION FOR PASSENGERS.

Morning Soup and Afternoon Tea will be served on Deck and in the Public Rooms at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. respectively.

**AUTOMOBILES.** In order to facilitate Customs clearance uncrated automobiles must be included on the U.S. Declaration Form.

**BAGGAGE.** Questions relating to Baggage should be referred to the Purser or ship's Baggage Master.

**U.S. Customs.** All passengers are required to make a declaration of personal baggage for the U.S. Customs authorities at New York. Blank declaration forms are obtainable from the Purser. Returning residents of the United States must declare all articles acquired abroad but wearing apparel and personal effects taken overseas from the U.S. in the first case are entitled to be passed free of duty upon return. An exemption of \$100.00 worth of purchases is allowed each returning resident, subject to certain conditions which will be detailed by the Customs officer. Visitors may take in free of duty wearing apparel and personal effects not intended for sale, but must declare all articles not included in this category. Severe penalties are imposed upon persons who make false declarations as to value, ownership or use of articles or who attempt to bribe or recompense a Customs officer.



**Customs Examination.** All articles liable to Customs duty must be declared. Any passenger who is in doubt should see the Purser or Baggage Master who will provide the latest information available.

On arrival baggage will be grouped alphabetically in Customs shed for examination. To help the passing and claiming of baggage passengers should have one of the Company's labels, bearing the initial letter of their surname, affixed to each piece. The bedroom stewards have a supply of these labels and will affix them prior to landing.

It is for passengers themselves to see that **all** their baggage is passed by the Customs authorities on landing, and they are specially requested to claim their baggage before leaving the Customs shed, otherwise delay and extra charges for carriage will be incurred in forwarding to destination any baggage not accompanying passengers directly from the ship.

**Checking baggage on arrival at New York** Facilities are available whereby passengers may arrange with the ship's Baggage Master for the transfer of their baggage from the Company's pier in New York to any point in Greater New York, Jersey City and Hoboken, including railroad terminals, hotels, residences, express companies or warehouses.

Passengers are thus relieved of this detail after disembarking. Rates and further information regarding this service can be obtained at the Purser's office.

**Baggage in Bond.** Passengers en route to destinations outside the U.S.A. may have their checked baggage forwarded "In Bond" to a frontier point under Customs manifest without examination of the contents by a Customs officer at New York. The Purser or Baggage Master will be pleased to supply information.

**Baggage Insurance.** Passengers are recommended to insure their baggage as the Company's liability is strictly limited in accordance with the terms of the passage contract. Baggage Insurance carrying world-wide cover can be arranged through the Purser's office.

**BARBER AND HAIRDRESSER.** The ship carries a well-equipped Barber's Shop and competent Hairdresser.

**CATERING.** Passengers are invited to advise the Head Waiter of their preference in the matter of diet and cooking and they can be assured of every attention to their wishes. Cooks of various nationalities are included in the kitchen personnel. It is suggested that passengers order their meals in advance, and the aforementioned official will readily assist passengers in making their choice.

**CUISINE.** Nous demandons aux passagers de bien vouloir faire connaître au Maître d'Hôtel leur préférence comme cuisine ou régime ; la plus grande attention sera apportée à leur donner satisfaction. Le personnel des cuisines comprend des Chefs de diverses nationalités. Les passagers sont invités à bien vouloir commander leur menu à l'avance, le maître d'hôtel est à leur entière disposition pour les guider dans leur choix.

**VERPFLEGUNG.** Die Passagiere werden gebeten, Wünsche wegen Diätküche oder besonderer Zubereitung der Speisen dem Oberkellner mitzuteilen. Es wird empfohlen, die gewünschten Gerichte im Voraus zu bestellen. Die beiden Genannten beraten die Passagiere bereitwilligst bei der Auswahl der Speisen. In der Küche sind Köche verschiedener Nationalitäten beschäftigt, sodass alle Wünsche weitestgehende Berücksichtigung finden können.

**CHEQUES.** Passengers are advised that the Purser cannot accept private cheques.

**CHANGES IN ACCOMMODATION.** The Purser alone is authorised to make changes in accommodation and may only do so on payment of any difference in fare which may be required according to the Company's current tariffs.

**COMPLAINTS.** Passengers entertaining any cause for complaint are requested to communicate particulars to a responsible officer in the ship, so that an opportunity may be afforded to adjust matters.



**DECK CHAIRS, CUSHIONS AND RUGS** are available for hire and can be obtained through the Deck Steward at the price of 5/- each article.

(Each rug is contained in a sealed envelope and bears a serial number worked into the material, thus enabling passengers to identify their own rugs).

**DOGS.** Passengers are notified that dogs should be handed over to the care of the live-stock attendant and that they are not allowed in Public Rooms or on the Passenger Decks.

**EXCHANGE OF MONEY.** For the convenience of passengers the Purser is able to exchange a limited amount of English, U.S. and Canadian money at rates which will be advised on application.

**FIRE PRECAUTIONS.** Passengers are specially requested to exercise care in disposing of cigar and cigarette ends and matches and to make use of the receptacles provided for the purpose in the different parts of the ship, in view of the serious consequences which can arise from carelessness in this respect. Throwing lighted cigarettes, etc., overboard should also be avoided.

**FIRE AND LIFEBOAT STATIONS.** Passengers are earnestly requested to acquaint themselves with the notice in the staterooms regarding lifeboat and fire stations.

The Captain specially appeals to passengers to assist him by promptly mustering at their appointed stations at all times when passenger boat station muster is being held. Only by immediate attendance at this important muster can passengers obtain the necessary instructions which are so vital to the well-being of all on board. The co-operation of every passenger is earnestly desired.

**IMPORTATION OF LIQUOR.** A considerable quantity of liquor imported in the baggage of passengers is purchased "in bond" at a price below the regular market value in the country of purchase and for that reason attention is called to the fact by the Collector, U.S. Customs Service, that the above market value must be ascertained and declared by the passenger instead of the price actually paid.

**LANDING ARRANGEMENTS.** The Purser will furnish passengers with a small card, detailing the landing arrangements, before arrival.

**LANDING CARDS.** It is necessary that passengers present their landing cards, together with passports to the immigration Inspector for endorsement before leaving the ship.

**LIBRARY.** The ship has a fully-equipped library and passengers are invited to borrow the volumes—no charge will be made.

**PASSAGE TICKETS.** Passengers are requested to hand their passage tickets to their bedroom stewards as soon as possible after embarkation.

**PASSENGERS' MAIL. Inward and Outward Steamers.** Passengers expecting urgent letters or telegrams should notify the Purser's Office. For the convenience of passengers, telegrams and postal matter are received aboard and distributed but without any responsibility whatsoever on the part of Cunard White Star Limited for non-delivery, mis-delivery or delay.

It will assist the system of delivery if letters are endorsed prominently in the top left-hand corner "Passengers' Mail" and addressed care of Cunard White Star at port of departure or arrival and also bear the following particulars:—

**Accommodation Addresses.** When it is desired to use any of the Company's Offices as accommodation addresses, it is essential that the envelopes be endorsed prominently in the top left-hand corner "Passengers' Mail, to await instructions" and be addressed care of the appropriate Cunard White Star Office or Agency.

**PAYMENTS.** Passengers should obtain a receipt on the Company's form for any payments made on board for additional passage money, rugs, chairs, excess baggage, etc.

**PORTHOLES.** As it is dangerous for passengers to handle the ports they are requested to ask the bedroom steward to open and close the ports in the staterooms as may be desired.

**PROFESSIONAL GAMBLERS** are reported as frequently travelling in Atlantic ships and passengers are warned to take precautions accordingly.

**RADIO AND CABLE MESSAGES.** Information and rates will be supplied by the Radio office.

**RADIO RECEIVERS AND ELECTRICAL APPARATUS.** Private radio receivers or other electrical apparatus must not be operated or connected to the ship's electrical supply circuits without official approval, applications for which should be made to the Purser. Passengers using loud-speakers are requested to avoid disturbing their fellow passengers.

**RETURN ACCOMMODATION.** For the convenience of those passengers who may be returning from the United States or Canada to Europe and who have not yet made the necessary arrangements the Purser will be pleased to radio for any accommodation required. This will enable passengers to complete their arrangements before leaving the ship and will consequently save them time and trouble after landing.

**ROTARIANS** travelling by this ship are invited to inspect the Rotary Register at the Purser's office and subscribe their names. The Purser will be glad, providing circumstances permit, to arrange an informal meeting during the voyage.

**SPECIAL NOTICE FOR ROUND TRIP PASSENGERS.**

All passengers holding return tickets are requested to communicate with the most convenient Company's office, if possible at least a week in advance of their intended sailing from the United States or Canada, so that the necessary formalities may be arranged in connection with their passage.

If for any reason the holder of a return ticket should be unable to travel by the sailing shown thereon, immediate advice should be given to the nearest Company's office, so that any accommodation held can be released and new reservation made in sailing selected.

**DEPARTURE FROM AMERICA—U.S. SAILING PERMIT.**

All passengers other than U.S. citizens require to obtain a sailing permit or income tax clearance prior to departure from the United States. This document can be obtained without difficulty from the Collector of Internal Revenue in each district, or on personal application, with passport and passage ticket a day or two before sailing, at Room 131, U.S. Custom House, foot of Broadway, New York City.

**THE SURGEON** is authorised to make customary charges for his services, subject to the approval of the Captain.

**A REGISTERED NURSE** is on board, whose services are available as necessary under the direction of the ship's Surgeon.



**TAXICABS** are no longer permitted by the New York City Authorities to enter any City pier properties for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers or baggage. The taxicab facilities heretofore provided on arrival day inside the pier are, therefore, no longer available. Passengers desiring taxicabs upon arrival at New York are now required to go outside the pier and make their own transportation arrangements.

Passengers are warned against using the services of unauthorised porters and baggage transfer men outside the pier gates in New York. Reliable baggage transfer men are available inside the piers. Authorised porters wear "Cunard White Star" blouses which are numbered.

**TRAVEL INFORMATION.** The Purser's office is at the disposal of passengers for furnishing detailed information concerning ship, rail or air connections and arrangements can be made for tickets and reservations to be obtained.

**UPPER BERTHS.** Passengers occupying upper berths can obtain steps for getting in and out of same on applying to the Steward or Stewardess.

**VALETING SERVICE.** A Clothes pressing room, in charge of an expert attendant, is provided and work of this kind will be carried out for passengers as may be required.

**VALUABLES.** In their own interests passengers are advised not to leave articles of jewellery and other valuables lying about. Articles not required for frequent wear may be deposited with the Purser and will be placed in an envelope sealed in the presence of the passenger for custody in the ship's safe. A receipt will be given but no liability as to contents can be accepted.

Passengers are advised to protect themselves by insurance, which can be arranged on board on application to the Purser.

Sir:

The information which I was given by the employees of your Service conflicts with some information which I obtained from the employees of the Department of Immigration at Ellis Island, and I am therefore writing to you in order to clear up those two questions upon which opinion seems to differ.

(1) Does the fact that I was absent from the United States for longer than a year, between the date of my application for the first paper and the issue of the first paper, taken together with the fact that my first paper states as lawful entry my last entry before my application for the first paper, but not the last entry before the issue of the first paper, constitute an irregularity which ought to be amended?

(2) When can I apply for my second paper?

In the following you will find all the facts which may be involved in deciding the above two questions:

I first came to the United States as a quota immigrant in 1931. I have since repeatedly left the United States for periods longer than a year, but I have on each of these occasions applied for a permit to re-enter which I used in returning to this country.

I applied for my first paper in 1935 stating that my last lawful entry for permanent residence in the United States was at New York on February 21, 1935,



and this entry is confirmed in the Certification No. 2-401937 which forms the basis of my first paper. I left this country after obtaining a permit to re-enter in 1935 before I received my first paper, and I was absent for longer than a year, returning in April, 1937. I received my first paper in the District Court of the United States, at New York, New York on the 8th of April, 1937, No. 395734, and this paper gives as my lawful entry for permanent residence the entry on February 21, 1935, that is, the entry on which my application for my first paper was based.

After my entry in April, 1937, I have not been absent from the United States for a period of a year or longer.

I shall much appreciate hearing from you in connection with the two above-stated questions.

## ESSENTIAL PROCEDURE AND REQUIREMENTS FOR NATURALIZATION UNDER THE GENERAL PROVI- SIONS OF THE NATIONALITY ACT OF 1940

*[If an alien comes within one of the classifications shown in paragraph 14 of this pamphlet, there are special provisions of the law applicable to such alien and he may be exempt from one or more of the following requirements. Information regarding these special provisions, if not transmitted herewith, may be obtained from any field office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, or the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D. C.]*

1. The naturalization laws apply to both men and women. The alien must be white, of African nativity or descent, or a descendant of a race indigenous to the Western Hemisphere. He must have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence. If the record shows admission was otherwise, on ascertaining that fact appropriate advice will be given the alien by the representative of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. The alien may file his declaration of intention in any naturalization court, regardless of his residence. He must reside within the jurisdiction of the court in which he desires to file his petition for naturalization, but if he wishes to file his petition in a State court, he may file the petition within the State judicial district or circuit in which he resides, whether or not he resides within the county in which the petition is filed.

### The First Step: MAKING THE DECLARATION OF INTENTION (Often Called "First Paper")

2. Procedure.—The alien should fill in carefully and sign (if able to write) preliminary application Form N-300 (formerly Form A-2213) according to the instructions on the back of the form. This form may be obtained, without cost, from any clerk of court exercising naturalization jurisdiction, or from any office of the Service. Information concerning its preparation, if needed, may be had from any office of this Service. The filled-in form, accompanied by three signed photographs of the applicant as described on the back of the form, should be submitted to the office of the Service named on the form. If the alien arrived in the United States after June 29, 1906, he will require a certificate of arrival from the Department of Justice, and in such cases should also submit with the filled-in form a money order, payable to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D. C., in the amount of \$2.50, as payment for the certificate of arrival. The alien will be notified by the field officer of this Service when he may appear before the clerk of court to make his declaration of intention. The declaration may be signed by mark, if the alien cannot write his name. A fee of \$2.50 is payable to the clerk of court at time of filing the declaration of intention.

3. The alien must be 18 years of age or over, and be able to meet the requirements of paragraph 1 hereof.

### The Second Step: FILING THE PETITION FOR NATURALIZATION (Often Called "Second Paper")

4. Procedure.—The alien should fill in carefully and sign (unless physically unable to write) preliminary application Form N-400 (formerly Form A-2214), according to the printed instructions on the back of the form. This form may be obtained, without cost, from any clerk of court exercising naturalization jurisdiction, or from any office of this Service. Information concerning its preparation, if needed, may be had from any office of this Service. The filled-in form, accompanied by three signed photographs of the applicant as required,

and, if required, his declaration of intention, should be submitted to the office of this Service named on the form. If, under the instructions contained in the form, a certificate of arrival is necessary, the applicant should also submit with Form N-400 a money order for \$2.50, payable to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D. C. Upon receipt of the form with proper enclosures, this Service will attend to certain necessary details and will notify the applicant when and where to appear with his witnesses.

5. Under the general provisions of the law, in addition to the requirements mentioned in paragraph 1 hereof, the applicant to file a petition for naturalization must have a declaration of intention not less than 2 nor more than 7 years old, and must have at least 5 years of continuous residence in the United States immediately preceding the filing of his petition. At least 6 months of this residence, just before the filing of his petition, must have been in the State where he resides at the time of filing the petition. All of such residence may be proved by the oral testimony of two qualified witnesses, if they have personal knowledge of it. If two qualified witnesses cannot be procured to cover all such residence, additional witnesses must be obtained. The required 6 months' State residence must be proved at the filing of the petition by affidavits forming a part thereof of at least two qualified witnesses, and at the final hearing by their oral testimony. If the petitioner has resided in two or more places in the State during the 6 months immediately preceding the filing of the petition, and for that reason two witnesses cannot be procured to testify to all such residence, it may be proved by the oral testimony of at least two witnesses for each place of residence in the State during the said 6 months. Residence outside of the 6 months immediately preceding the filing of the petition may be established by depositions of qualified witnesses. If depositions are needed, the naturalization examiner will give the applicant appropriate advice about them. All witnesses mentioned herein must be citizens of the United States.

6. Applicants for naturalization are required by regulation to pass an educational examination. The purpose of this examination is to determine whether the petitioner has a fair knowledge of the fundamental principles of the Constitution of the United States and is qualified to take up the duties and responsibilities of a citizen of the United States. The educational examination includes questions as to—

- (1) the principal historical facts concerning the development of the United States as a republic,
- (2) the organization and principal functions of the Government of the United States, and of the States and local units of government, and
- (3) the relation of the individual in the United States to government—National, State, and local, the rights and privileges growing from that relationship, and the duties and responsibilities which result from it.

A Federal Textbook on Citizenship has been issued to assist applicants for naturalization in preparing for this examination. Copies are furnished free for the use of applicants for naturalization who are in public-school or W. P. A. classes. They may be bought by other persons from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for 50 cents a copy, or at 25 cents a copy if 10 or more are bought at one time.

7. In addition to their personal knowledge of petitioner's residence, the witnesses must also be qualified to testify from personal knowledge as to the petitioner's good moral character, his attachment to the principles of the Constitution of the United States, and his disposition toward the good order and happiness of the United States.

8. The applicant must sign his petition in his own handwriting, unless physically unable to write. He must be able to speak English, unless physically unable to do so.

9. A fee of \$5 for the petition for naturalization is payable to the clerk of court at the time of filing such petition.

#### The Third or Final Step: THE HEARING IN COURT

10. Under the general provisions of the law, at least 30 days must elapse after the petition is filed before the petitioner may appear before the court for final action on his petition. He will be notified of the date of the hearing,

as naturalization hearing dates are fixed by the court. The petitioner must appear in person before the court with his witnesses, unless such witnesses are told by the naturalization examiner that they are excused from further attendance. If, upon the final hearing in open court, the court finds that the petitioner is entitled to naturalization, the petitioner takes the oath of allegiance to the United States and is given the certificate of naturalization.

#### EFFECT OF ABSENCE FROM THE UNITED STATES UPON ELIGIBILITY FOR NATURALIZATION

11. An absence from the United States for a continuous period of more than 6 months and less than 1 year, during the period immediately preceding the filing of the petition for naturalization or during the period between the date of filing petition and the date of final hearing, for which continuous residence is required, raises a presumption of interrupted residence, which, however, may be overcome by evidence showing, to the satisfaction of the naturalization court, that the applicant had a reasonable cause for not sooner returning to the United States. An absence from the United States for a continuous period of 1 year or more, during the periods for which continuous residence is required, breaks the continuity of residence conclusively, except as noted in paragraph 11 hereof. Where the continuity of petitioner's residence has been broken by an absence, he will not be in a position to file a new petition for naturalization until the required period of continuous residence has elapsed from the date of his return to the United States after such absence.

12. If an alien has a valid declaration of intention, has resided in the United States for at least 1 year subsequent to lawful admission for permanent residence, and is going or has been abroad prior to June 25, 1936:

(a) In the employ of or under contract with the Government of the United States; or

(b) For the purpose of carrying on scientific research on behalf of an American institution of research recognized as such by the Attorney General, and such alien is employed by or under contract with such institution; or

(c) For the purpose of engaging wholly or in part in the development of foreign trade and commerce of the United States as an employee of an American firm or corporation, or subsidiary; or

(d) For the purpose of protecting the property rights of such firm or corporation in any foreign country or countries,

his absence from the United States of 1 year or more may not break the continuity of his residence for naturalization purposes under the provisions of section 307 of the Nationality Act of 1940. Applications for the benefits of section 307 (b) of the Nationality Act of 1940 should be made on Form N-470 in accordance with the instructions thereon. Such form may be obtained without cost, from any field office of this Service or from the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D. C.

13. An alien, who is the husband or wife of a citizen of the United States so employed in one of the groups mentioned in (a) to (d) of paragraph 11 of this circular, and whose spouse is regularly stationed abroad in such employment, may be naturalized with no requirement of a declaration of intention or of prior residence in the United States or within the jurisdiction of the naturalization court.

14. An alien who has been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, but who has since been temporarily absent therefrom solely in his or her capacity as a regularly ordained clergyman or nun, is considered as residing in the United States for the purpose of naturalization, notwithstanding any such absence from the United States, provided such alien proves to the satisfaction of the Attorney General and the naturalization court that his or her absence from the United States has been solely in the capacity herebefore described. Appropriate form (N-470) for seeking the determination of the Attorney General may be obtained from any field office of this Service or from the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D. C.

## EXEMPTIONS FROM SOME OF THE PROVISIONS OF THE GENERAL NATURALIZATION LAW

15. If an alien comes within one of the following classifications, there are special provisions of the law applicable to his case, and information regarding these special provisions, if not transmitted herewith, may be obtained from any field office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, or the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, Washington, D. C.:

*(a)* Children under 18 years of age in whose behalf a petition for naturalization may be filed by a citizen parent or by a citizen adoptive parent.

*(b)* Alien (man or woman) who after September 21, 1922, and prior to May 24, 1934, has married a citizen of the United States, or an alien married prior to May 24, 1934, whose spouse was naturalized during such period and during the existence of the marital status.

*(c)* Any alien, who may have been married to a citizen of the United States on or after May 24, 1934, or whose husband or wife may have been naturalized on or after such date, and during the existence of the marital status.

*(d)* Any woman who, prior to September 22, 1922, lost United States citizenship by marriage to an alien, or by the expatriation of a spouse, and any woman who lost citizenship by marriage on or after September 22, 1922, by marriage to an alien ineligible to citizenship.

*(e)* Any alien who on January 13, 1941, is the spouse of a citizen of the United States, or who thereafter marries a citizen of the United States, or whose spouse may be naturalized after such date, and who immediately preceding the filing of a petition for naturalization has lived in marital union in the United States with such citizen spouse for 1 year and for 2 years continuously in the United States.

*(f)* A native-born woman who, prior to September 22, 1922, lost American citizenship by marriage to an alien, and such marital status with the alien has or shall have terminated, or she has resided continuously in the United States since the date of such marriage, and has not acquired the nationality of a foreign country by affirmative act other than such marriage.

*(g)* Alien erroneously exercising the rights of citizenship during the 5 years next preceding July 1, 1920, or prior to that time, because of misinformation regarding his citizenship status.

*(h)* Any alien, including a native-born Filipino, who has served honorably at any time in the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard, for a period or periods aggregating 3 years, provided the petition for naturalization is filed while the alien is still in such service or within 6 months after discharge therefrom.

*(i)* Any alien who has served honorably for an aggregate period of 5 years on vessels of more than 20 tons burden, having a home port in the United States and registered under the laws thereof, or on certain Government-owned vessels, provided the petition for naturalization is filed while the alien is still in such service, or within 6 months after separation therefrom.

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\*Cases not requiring declarations of intention.

Dear Mr. Muller:

Confirming our phone conversation I am enclosing herewith the application for second naturalization papers for Mr. Leo Szilard. I shall appreciate your giving this matter your kind attention.

The occasion for making this request is that Mr. Szilard is one of the key men engaged upon Project S-5 of the Office of Scientific Research and Development which is rated by the War Department as one of highest priority. Because of his importance to this project even though technically an alien, Mr. Szilard has been cleared by the Military Intelligence for work on this project. It is, nevertheless, a handicap to us for him to operate under the restrictions of an alien in carrying through the work which we expect him to perform. These activities involve among other things, frequent travel to various parts of the country and would make preferable at the present time residence in Chicago rather than in New York.

Mr. Szilard has maintained his legal residence in New York and during the past few months has spent most of his time in that city. He has come, however, to Chicago for frequent conferences.

I should note that Dr. Szilard is a physicist and engineer of high standing. I have personally been acquainted with him for a number of years. That he has the complete confidence of his American colleagues is evident from the manner in which we have drawn him into our defense program.

I have received your letter of June 1 relative to the Leo Szilard case, and in the light of the information and request contained therein, arrangements are being made for Mr. Szilard to file his petition at an early date. Notice of the date and hour for his appearance with his witnesses will be mailed to him shortly.

Upon examination of the file in the case, I note that the alien is an Hungarian, and basing my opinion upon the reports which appear in the newspapers, I feel satisfied that before the end of this week war will have been declared by the United States against Hungary, and if and when such a declaration has been made, Mr. Szilard will be in the unfortunate position of being an enemy alien within the meaning of the naturalization laws. As you probably are aware, there are certain statutes now in force which operate to delay, - but do not prohibit, - final action in connection with the petitions for naturalization filed by enemy aliens. However, that phase of the matter is one which will have to be left for later adjustment. The point is, as above stated, that arrangements are being made for the filing of the petition without delay.

## NAUTICAL TERMS

---

- Abaft:** Toward the stern; further aft than.
- Aft:** At, toward, or near the stern.
- Alleyway:** Passageway.
- Altitude:** Angular elevation of the Pole above the horizon.
- Ballast:** Any weight or weights used to keep the ship from becoming top-heavy.
- Beam:** Greatest width of a vessel.
- Bilge:** The flat, or nearly flat, part of a ship's bottom.
- Bilge Keels:** Fin-like strips running lengthwise and projecting from the outer bilge on some ships to prevent rolling.
- Bilge-water:** Foul water that collects in the bilge of a ship.
- Bits:** Heavy steel castings fitted to a deck for securing mooring lines or hawsers.
- Boom:** A long, round, heavy spar, pivoted at one end, generally used for hoisting cargo, etc. On sailing vessels the spar holding the bottom of a fore-and-aft sail.
- Bow:** The forward part of a vessel.
- Bridge:** The observation platform or partial deck built across and above a ship's deck for the use of officers in navigating the vessel.
- Bulkhead:** A vertical partition running from side to side or fore-and-aft-beneath the deck. A collision bulkhead is the first partition forward, near the bow.
- Bunker:** A compartment used for storage of fuel.
- Cable:** The chain to which the anchor is fastened. The term "cable's length" means about 100 fathoms or 600 feet, one-tenth of a sea mile.
- Capstan:** A windlass for winding the cable.
- Chart:** A sea map used in navigation, showing depth of the sea, location of rocks, configuration of coast, etc.
- Chart Room:** Navigating room.
- Coaming:** The vertical boundary of a hatch or skylight.
- Companionway:** A staircase at the entrance of a ship's cabin.
- Crow's Nest:** A barrel or box on the ship's foremast where the lookout is stationed.

**Davits:** Heavy vertical pillars used to support the ends of a boat when hoisting or lowering.

**Deadlight:** Covering for portholes made of metal or wood and used in severe weather.

**Dead Reckoning:** Method of ascertaining the approximate position of a vessel from the course steered and the distance run; when heavenly bodies or land are obscured.

**Dog:** A small, bent metal fitting, used to close doors, hatch covers, etc.

**Draft or Draught:** The depth to which a vessel sinks in the water; one commonly speaks of a ship's "drawing" so many feet of water, which is the equivalent of its draft.

**Drift Current:** Movement of the surface of the sea.

**Ebb Tide:** The falling tide.

**Equinox:** Equal length of day and night, the vernal equinox occurring toward the end of March and the autumnal toward the end of September.

**Fathom:** Six feet.

**Flood Tide:** Rising tide.

**Fo'c's'le:** "Forecastle"; seaman's living quarters, usually in the bow.

**Fore-and-aft:** Lengthwise with the ship.

**Forward:** Toward the bow.

**Galley:** The ship's kitchen.

**Glory Hole:** Steward's quarters. Usually aft, over the propellers.

**Hatch:** An opening in a deck.

**Hawse Pipes:** Openings in the bow for the anchor chain.

**Hawser:** A large rope or wire, commonly used for making fast to a pier or tender.

**Hold:** The part of a ship below decks reserved for the storage of freight or baggage.

**House Flag:** The pennant usually flown on the mainmast, bearing the emblem of her owners.

**Hurricane Deck:** A deck with no overhead protection.

**Keel:** The central longitudinal beam at the extreme underside of the vessel; the foundation of the entire construction.

**Knot:** A nautical mile. The British Admiralty knot is 6,080 feet; the statute knot is 6,082.66 feet or 1.151 land miles.

**Lead:** A mass of lead used for taking depths at sea.

**Lee or Leeward:** The side of the vessel away from the wind.

**Log:** (a) An instrument towed by the vessel at the end of a long line, recording approximate distance traveled.

(b) Official daily record of a voyage, including weather, wind, direction and velocity, distance traveled, etc.

**Mid-ship:** Toward the middle or "waist" of a vessel; is equally distant from bow and stern. The term "amidships" is frequently used.

**Mooring:** Securing a ship in position by lines so it cannot move or swing; anchoring.

**Overhang:** Portion of hull at the stern, over and unsupported by the water.

**Pilot:** Usually the licensed "guide" who comes aboard ship from a near port and directs its course through the local channel to anchorage or pier, or from the pier to the outer end of the channel.

**Pilot House:** Sheltered position connected with the bridge from which the ship is steered.

**Pitching:** See-saw motion caused by the plunging of the vessel's head into the sea and the consequent raising of the stern. Distinguished from rolling, which is a movement from side to side.

**Poop:** Raised deck toward the stern of the vessel.

**Port:** The left side of a vessel. French, babord.

**Porthole:** Stateroom window.

**Rudder:** The hinged projection astern for steering, controlled by chains from under the bridge.

#### Sailing Vessels:

(a) A full-rigged ship has usually three masts, on all of which are square sails.

(b) A bark has three or four masts, all square-rigged except the after or mizzenmast, which is fore-and-aft rigged.

(c) A barkentine has three masts, the foremost square-rigged, the other two fore-and-aft rigged.

(d) A brig has two masts, both square-rigged.

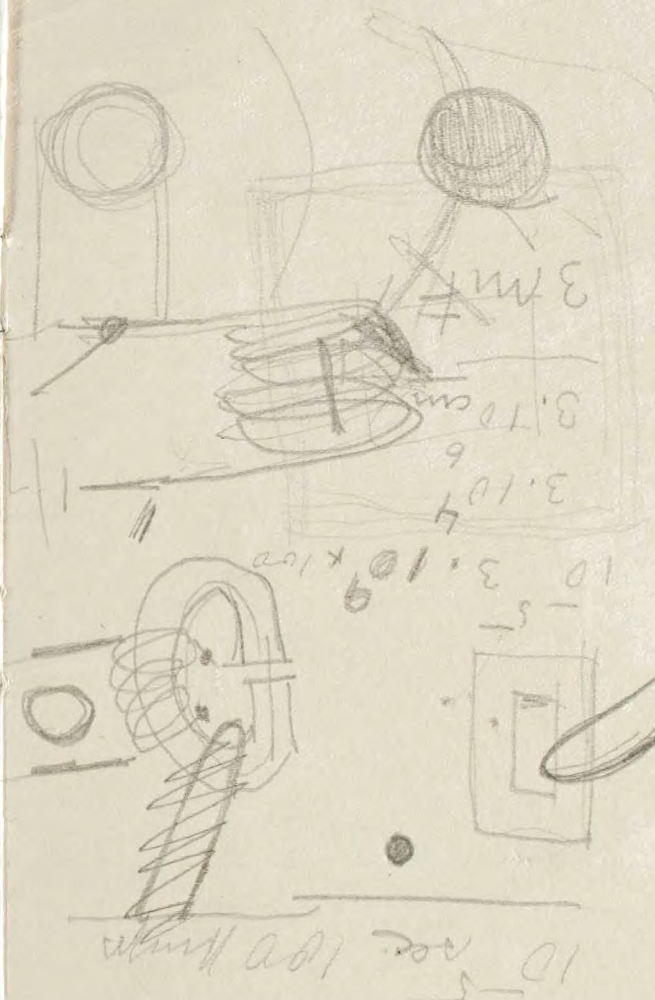
(e) A brigantine has two masts, square-rigged except for a fore-and-aft mainsail.

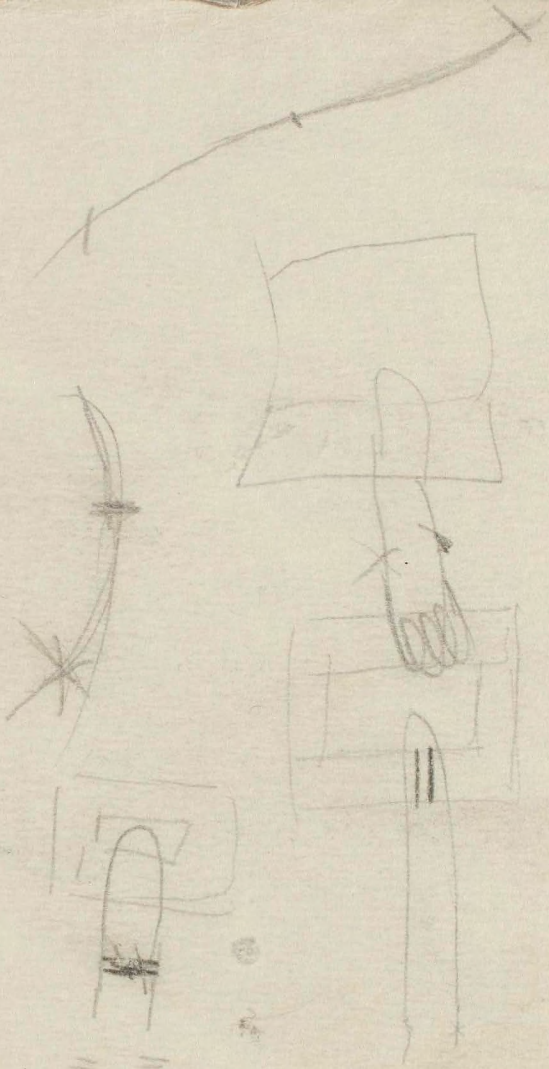
(f) A schooner has two or more masts, with fore-and-aft sails.

(g) A sloop has a single mast, fore-and-aft rigged.

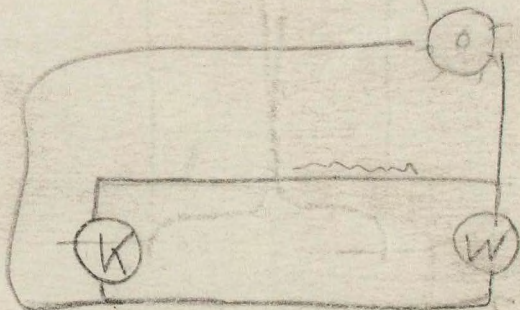

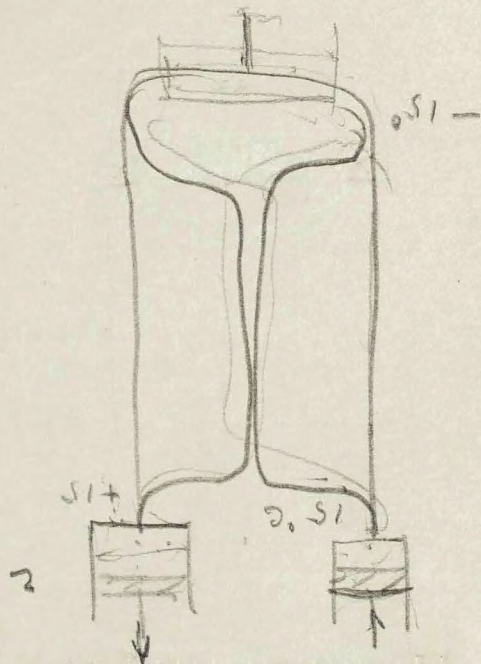

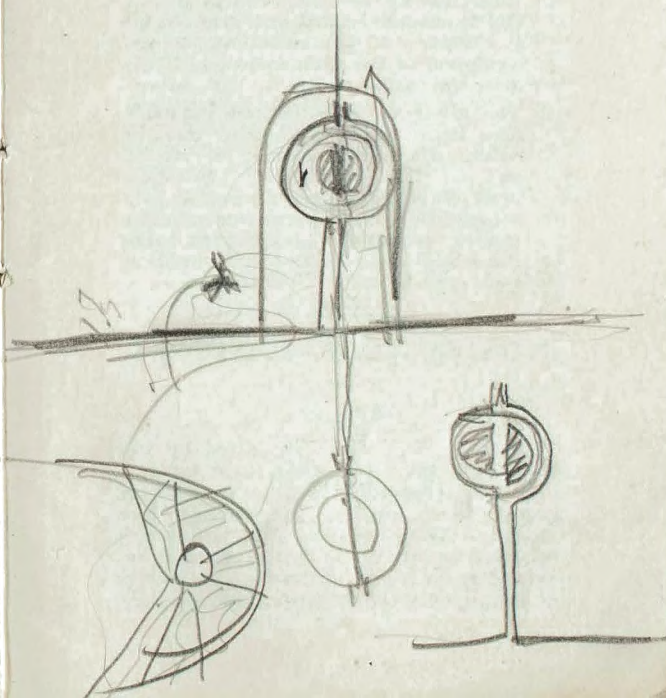

## RECOVERY OF UNITED STATES HEAD TAX



Refund of Head Tax can be obtained provided passengers have complied with the following conditions:—

- (1) Inform the U.S. Immigration Inspector on arrival that it is their intention to leave the United States within 60 days, and obtain from the Inspector "Head Tax Refund Certificate" (Form 514).
- (2) When leaving the United States to have the departure certified on Form 514 by the Purser of the vessel or by the conductor of the train upon which the departure takes place.
- (3) The Immigration Authorities impose a time limit of 120 days from date of entry, after which claims for refund will not be considered. Passengers must, therefore, submit Form 514, duly completed, to the Company in sufficient time to enable the Company to make their application within this limit of time (120 days).

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## NOTICE TO PASSENGERS



### TAXI-CABS

Taxicabs are no longer permitted by the New York City Authorities to enter any City pier properties for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers or baggage. The taxicab facilities heretofore provided on arrival day inside the pier are, therefore, no longer available. Passengers desiring taxicabs upon arrival at New

York are now required to go outside the pier and make their own transportation arrangements with taxicabs.

Passengers are warned against using the services of unauthorised porters and baggage transfer men outside the pier gates in New York. Reliable baggage transfer men are available inside the piers. Authorised porters wear "Cunard White Star" blouses which are numbered.

Fees on domestic registered C. O. D. mail range from 25 cents to \$1.20. Indemnity claims must be filed within one year (C. O. D. six months) from date of mailing.
