## Annual Fine Arts Festival To Include German Theme

German arts will be the theme of the 18th annual Fine Arts Festival this spring. Dr. Michael Winesanker, chairman of the music department, is in charge of the festival this year.

There will be 10 events scheduled throughout March, April and May.

The University Orchestra and Chorus will present Brahms' "German Requiem" as the opening event on March 8.

As its part in the festival, the Little Theatre will present "Mary Stuart" on March 13.

There will be an art exhibition of works done by the faculty members and an organ recital on March 15 by Professor Emmet Smith.

The following week on March 22, the Faculty Woodwind Quintet and the Faculty Trio will present a program of chamber music.

Guest artist, Theodore Ullman, will give a piano recital of Beethoven's Sonata Recital on April 5.

A dual piano recital will be presented on April 12 by Joe Bratcher of the faculty and Dr. Fritz Oberdoerffer of the University of Texas.

The University Symphony Orchestra will give a concert April 14 which will be conducted by Dr. Ralph Guenther.

Martatil Singher, artist-in-resi-

dence from the Metropolitan Opera, will present a recital of German lieder on May 6.

The last program, May 15 and 16, will include Gluck's opera, "Orfeo." This will be the first time that an opera has been a part of the festival.

## Best-Dressed Field Narrows

When 21 of TCU's better dressed and more charming coeds are in the same contest, it's difficult to select the five best dressed and most charming.

The 10 judges in the contest to find the Best-Dressed Woman at TCU Friday met the nominees at a tea sponsored by Student Congress and The Skiff—and later deliberated more than 45 minutes, discussing the merits of each candidate before selecting the five finalists by ballot.

Choices were Linda Hildreth, Fort Worth junior, nominated by Kappa Alpha Theta; Gayle Meyer, Fort Worth senior, nominated by Kappa Kappa Gamma; Janice Michener, Midland senior, nominated by the Activities Council; Bettie B. One of the five will be TCU's entry in the nationwide contest sponsored by Glamour magazine and will be eligible to win an expense-paid trip to New York

this summer via American Airlines. She will be chosen Friday after another interview with the judges.

The yardstick used for measuring the nominees was taken from a Glamour list of 10 points stressing a good figure and beautiful posture, shining, well-kept hair, good grooming and individuality and appropriateness in dress.

Since the Glamour contest winners will appear on national television and will represent their school in September College Issue and on the magazine's collegiate fashion board, the judges also appraised the nominee's poise and graciousness of manner.

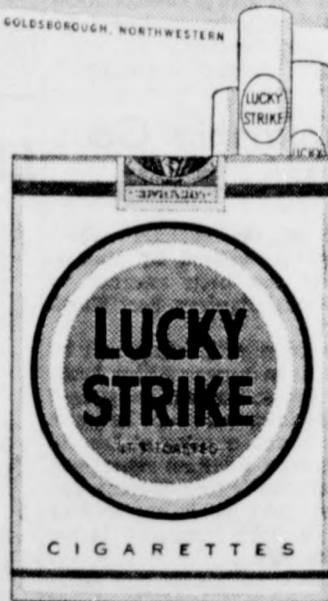

# Bustling Basketeers Bag Bacon; Beaming Brannon Busts Buttons

In 11 years as head basketball mentor, Buster Brannon has coached four TCU teams to conference championships. But the 1959 squad, he says, "is the greatest team I've ever been associated with."

And he doesn't spare the adjectives when he talks about them.

"They've got drive and burning desire that are marks of true champions. They're not selfish, and they don't care who makes the points. They just want to win," he says proudly, "and they did."

The Frogs snared the title Saturday night with a win over Texas, and earned a berth in the NCAA Western Regional playoffs in Lawrence, Kan., on March 13-14.

It was on the wooden floors of

Gregory Gym that the determined TCU team fought off the offensive measures of the upset-minded Longhorns, led by Jay Arnette, who was a constant terror throughout the evening.

A slight upheaval in Lubbock the same night added the final ounce of flavor to the frosting. Texas Tech downed second-place SMU to put the Frogs in front by 3½ games with only two remaining.

"The boys were tired after that schedule, but they really turned it on the other night," said Brannon, as he found time to relax a bit this week for the first time this season.

Although the season end is two games away, the 1959 champs now have an 18-4 record.

"We'll sure be gunning for SMU and Baylor and try to make that a 20-4 mark. That'll really be the mark of a champion," stated Brannon.

"We played a fast schedule and traveled lots. Of course, when the pressure is always on, the substitutes just don't have an opportunity to play as much as I'd like 'em to. But the team al-

ways got along together and that's good," said Brannon.

Brannon takes the champs to Dallas Saturday to play SMU and concludes the regular season next Tuesday at home with Baylor.

In Lawrence, Kan., the Frogs will meet the winner of the Missouri Valley Conference.

"We'll be ready for 'em," Brannon says. "H. E. (Kirchner) and Ronny (Stevenson) should be in fine shape and of course, those three guys that keep the opposition honest—Nippert, Brunson and King—will be keyed up, too."

"Old Nip'll have a chance to see a lot of movies this week, and maybe he'll have time to catch up on some of those he missed the last three weeks," he chortled.

### 'Weather Is Fighting Us'

Coach Rabbit McDowell leaned back in his rickety wooden chair and drawled slowly, "This weather has got to clear up or we'll be limp as an old wash rag."

The baseball tutor was referring to the rainy and damp days his players had encountered the past few days.

"We've just got four more days to apply some polish to the team before the opener," said McDowell.

Next Monday will be the season's initial game for the Frogs when they play host to Abilene Christian College.

The ACC team received the same treatment from "Ole Man Winter." The Western Christians cancelled several workouts last week because of rain and wet grounds.

McDowell said because of the weather he will play it safe the first few games.

"I may use as many as four pitchers in each game. I don't want anyone to get tired or work too long with the dampness in the air," he said.

"Of course if the weather suddenly warms up and the field gets in good shape, it'll be a different game to plan for."

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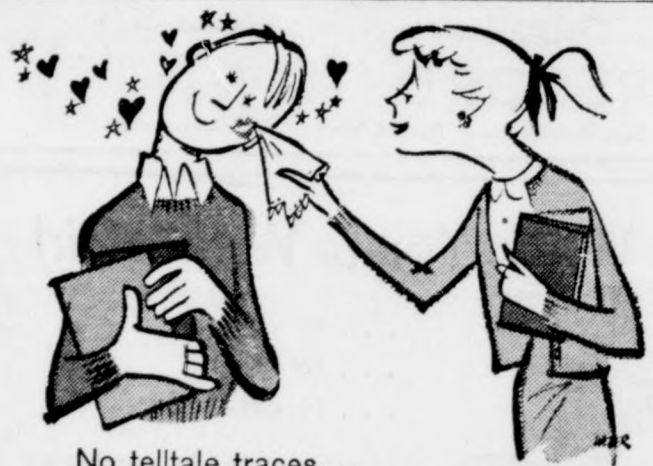
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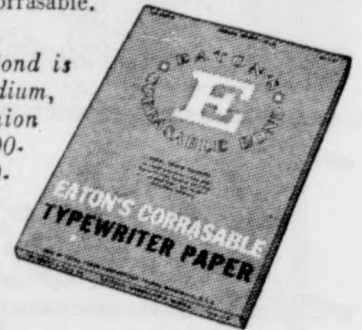
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
