New members are now able to sign up for the Guild by completing an online application form. Whether its an application for Full Membership, a Friend of the Guild, Overseas Membership or to convert your existing Full Membership to become an Honorary Member it can all be accessed from the Membership and Subscriptions page. Once an application form has been completed the appropriate invoice will be issued by email and it can be paid online with a debit or credit card, or payment can be made in the traditional ways by cheque or bank transfer. New subscriptions will run for 12 months from the date of joining and a renewal invoice will automatically be issued on the due date.

Existing membership renewals are also being added to this system and so current members will receive a renewal invoice at the start of December due to be paid by 1st January. Whether you pay your subscription yourself, or if you need to forward the invoice on to your manager for payment this system will be much more user friendly and will avoid much of the labour-intensive work for the Bursar in issuing paper invoices/receipts and reminders.

The Guild of Mac-Bearers has had a website since 2003 and in all those years it has only ever undergone two major changes in the way it is set up. In 2016 I started to plan the next big change and finally, after three years of sporadic activity the benefits of the overhaul have started to become apparent.

In 2003 we had a very basic site set up with a few static pages of information designed and hosted by Salford City Council. In 2004 I rebuilt the site in Microsoft Frontpage which gave me the ability to make changes whenever required from my home computer and it continued to be updated using that system until earlier this year. The problem with Frontpage is that it requires you to have the program and a copy of the website on your computer and so I was always conscious that if I ever relinquished the post of webmaster we would need to find someone else with that particular program and knowledge of how to use it. As a result, about three years ago I set about recreating the website in Wordpress, the universal standard now for web builders, a system that has the site hosted remotely so it can be accessed by the site administrator from any computer with a web-browser.

The re-write continued spasmodically as time permitted while I slowly mastered Wordpress but two things occurred this year which finally forced my hand to get on and finish the job. The first was that Microsoft discontinued Frontpage so parts of the site stopped functioning properly and the second was that I was summoned to attend the Guild Conference!

These two issues gave me the kick I needed to complete the job and a couple of weeks after the conference in March the new site was launched. At first glance, nothing much has changed, perhaps a colour makeover and a fresher look for the home page, but the content is much the same, however, in the background, much has changed and there is much more to come.

Users wishing to access the Members-only areas of the site can now register online without having to email me to ask for an account to be set-up, and the biggest improvement has been the introduction of an online shop where everyone can now buy guild badges, ties and other items of memorabilia using a credit or debit card and receive them within a couple of days. Gone are the days of filling in an order form and posting a cheque to the bursar.



Much more is on the way – the next big step is to automate the joining process and subscriptions so (hopefully) by the time this magazine is published new members will be able to apply and pay online to join the guild and automatically receive a renewal reminder and invoice 12 months later. This will not only make life easier for members but will lift a huge burden of paperwork from the Bursar and hopefully dramatically improve the Guild's cash-flow saving us the arduous task of chasing unpaid subscriptions for months.

Ultimately, once all this work is completed I might actually be in a position to hand over the role to someone else – which was actually my motivation for starting the rewrite in the beginning!

Please do visit the site at www.macebearer.com and let

me know what you think – I'm open to suggestions of what you would like added or changed on the site and if its within my capabilities – and time permits – I'll see what I can do.

The first was to Deal Maritime and Local History Museum. This little museum packed a lot into a relatively small area. Particularly moving was a small display on the 11 Royal Marines Bandsmen killed in an IRA bomb attack on Deal Barracks in 1989.

Later we visited Deal Timeball Tower. The Timeball Is programmed to drop every day at 1pm. This signal allowed ships to check the accuracy of their chronometers. We had a superb guided tour of the tower and would recommend a visit should you be in the area.

Maces, Maces and Maces

Owen Collier of Royal Wootton Bassett sent in a newspaper article (reproduced here) from the Swindon Advertiser relating to the Swindon Mace.

MAYORAL MACE IS ACE

The Swindon Mace has the cypher of King Edward VIII who abdicated in 1936 before his coronation. There are thought to be only six such examples. One, according to the article is in Canada.



Town's rare reminder of a 20th century Royal crisis

At Portsmouth's Seafarer's service the Maces from Portsmouth and neighbouring boroughs were in attendance (with their Mayor's of course). These maces show the differences in maces in use.



From top to bottom

Portsmouth Great Mace— Silver Gilt dating from the 17th Century (Pre 1678).

Fareham—a wood shaft of lignum vitae with heavy silver and gold plated accoutrements. Dating from 1974.

Gosport—carved from the mast of H. M. S. Victory. Made of Lignum Vitae Wood (and is very very heavy!!)

Havant— A more modern wooden mace



2018 marked 100 years since the end of the war that began on July 28, 1914. By the time the conflict ended four years, three months and 14 days later on November 11, 1918, over 700,000 British military soldiers had been killed. Worldwide it is estimated that over 16million people were killed and over 37 million people injured in the conflict

It was fitting that 100 years after the ceasefire all victims of the conflict were remembered in a series of commemorative events. Below are just few of the events that Guild Members were involved in.



In Ripon on 14 November 2018 Wilfrid Owen's bugle that he carried during the first world war was played at the Ripon Horn blowing ceremony.

Wilfred Owen was a renowned War Poet and many of his best works were written in Ripon between March and June 1918. He lived in Ripon for a number of months while recovering from shell shock.

Remembrance Tuesday 13th 2018 at the War Cross in Seaford Cemetery where there are 253 War Graves from WW1: mainly West Indian and Canadian (with about 16 US citizens amongst the latter), stationed at Seaford, and many of them victims of flu. This commemoration involves local ex-Servicemen and Women, representatives of the Canadian Forces, West Indian Ex-Servicemen, and today the Deputy Lieutenant of East Sussex. The Mayor lays her wreath. The Town Serjeant is holding the Elizabeth 1st Mace. (Credit Peter White)





06 June 2019 marked 75 years from D-Day. Whilst this anniversary was marked throughout the country Portsmouth was chosen as the focus for the national commemoration.

Events were held on 05 June with HM Queen Elizabeth and leaders from Europe and across 'the pond' in attendance, as were over 300 D-Day veterans who later travelled on MV Boudicca to France for commemoration events on the anniversary itself.

The Lord Mayor of Portsmouth, Councillor David Fuller presented the keys of the city to the Queen. Apparently she asked which lock they fitted!.

The Blitz during World War 2 affected many cities across the UK. On the South coast, Portsmouth and Southampton were both targets. In both cities Guildhalls received direct hits.

On 6th November 1940, Southampton suffered a daylight raid. 12 bombs were dropped and one, a 500lb high explosive hit the Civic Centre penetrating to the lower floors of the art gallery killing 35 people including 14 children having an art lesson in the basement.





On 10th January 1941 Portsmouth Guildhall was almost completely destroyed with only the outer walls and tower left standing. The civic insignia had been locked in the vault and miraculously survived intact.

With such important commemorations taking place relating to the two World Wars it is easy to forget other conflicts that have taken place. 37 years after the liberation of the Falkland Isles a flag raising ceremony was held in Portsmouth.

The Falklands flag was gifted to the City of Portsmouth and will now permanently fly alongside the Union Flag opposite the Square Tower in Portsmouth.



Aldeburgh Serjeant at Mace Retires



Aldeburgh Town Council's Serjeant at Mace, Charlie Walker, has recently stepped down from the role he's held for nearly 27 years.

Charlie, a man admired and respected throughout the county of Suffolk, retired at the end of 2018 and has handed over to another Charlie – local GP, Dr Charlie Townsley.

Aldeburgh's new Serjeant at Mace, Charlie Townsley, divides his time between GP duties and his role as a member of the town's Lifeboat crew. He lives in Aldeburgh with his wife Ali and their two children.

Mr Walker also has a long association with the town's Lifeboat which started as a member of the beach crew and now, he is the Lifeboat Operations Manager. Prior to that, he was the Officer Commanding the Aldeburgh Coastguard.

He is an active member of the George Crabbe Lodge of the Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes, which supports local charities and organisations.

Watched by his wife Beryl, Mr Walker was presented with an oil painting by artist David Gillingwater at the Town's Annual Meeting in March to thank him for his many years of dedicated civic service.

Mr Walker and the Mace Bearer of Ipswich Borough Council, Andrew Beal, have been passing on their wealth of experience to Dr Townsley, whose first civic role will be at the Aldeburgh Carnival in August.



Currently the major City Ceremonies are undertaken by her predecessor but on all other occasions Heather is 'Serjeant-at-Mace.'

Heather was a professional commercial driver for just over twenty years, before taking her post with the City of Portsmouth, experienced as a Taxi Driver, independent Owner Driver Operator, Midas trained up to 16 seater minibuses with experience and training enabling her to provide service to vulnerable members of the community. Her driving experiences have taken her all across the United Kingdom, France, Portugal and briefly Spain.

Heather has been involved in all the major events with the City's Lord Mayor and Mayoress with the climax of events, so far, attending the Lord Mayor when he presented the Keys of the City to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II when she graced the City for the D-Day75 celebrations on the 5th June 2019 with fourteen other Heads of State.

The City's Silver, Charters, art and valuable memorabilia come under Heather's care with the Lord Mayor's Housekeeper and she is responsible for all his Regalia when on official duties.

Heather is married with four grown up children and lives in Portsmouth.

I have now got it in the shop whilst things are all sorted and noticed how similar the carving is to this Mace from a hundred years earlier. I'm hoping to learn a few tunes whilst it's here.





Meanwhile my son Joseph has now, aged thirteen exceeded me in height and still has an interest in the work. Look closely at this photograph and you'll see him tucked down beside a couple of Mace cases back in 2006.

Here he is visiting Bolton Town Hall earlier this year to collect and mostly repair this broken mace shaft , suitably togged up in mask and paper jacket.





Incidentally it was held together with a cardboard and aluminium foil sleeve squished into place by the previous repairers. In the picture he is moulding wax mace shafts to cast-up in silver as brooches. His pay will finance his school trip this summer so remember they're £ 100 all inc. Gilt or Silver. Inc post.



He officially begins part-time work here after his 14th Birthday in September.



His big sister Sarah whom most of you already know is also now part-time (she has two toddlers) so of course as always I'm super busy. She wears it all the time without worry and there's no insurance cover.



I've also had a chap in last week with a £50,000 watch that he wears constantly. It's strange how insurers are so restrictive with regard to Civic Insignia although only three weeks ago a local town hall was burgled of its collection of legacy chains of office, conveniently displayed in a simple glass case to attract criminals who don't do homework. They took £80,000 value at replacement cost of chains and will if they are lucky get £700 in scrap value for the silver, such a shame. Almost exactly the same thing happened not ten miles away from that town hall just thirty years ago.

Flight in a Two Seater Spitfire SM520

Southampton is the home of the Spitfire designed by R J Mitchell. Not far from where I live is the location of the Supermarine factory where these magnificent machines were built. David Knight former Macebearer in Poole was lucky enough to get a flight in one of the few remaining two seater Spitfires.





My wife Marcia bought me one of the best Birthday presents that can be bought, after which we had mutually

decided to buy a present together as we have now run out of ideas.

The first date had to be cancelled due to poor weather, the next date was a perfect day, not telling me where we were going, I drove. Our destination was reached Goodwood House by which time I had an inclining of what was on the cards. On

arrival we were greeted by a mutual friend who happened to be the director of air operations at Goodwood. The flight was organised through Boultbee Flying Academy a general introduction followed by safety briefing, have you changed your mind, now is the time to pull out and receive a full refund, you must be joking!!

After the briefing we were allowed into the hanger where there were a variety of plane and maintenance operations being undertaken, we had free access within the hanger. Flying suits head fire protection and a crash helmet and gloves were supplied

I was the last of the four to fly, the aircraft had to sit for at least 45 minutes between flights, plenty of time to go over the emergency drill as laid down during the briefing, drop the seat open the canopy drop the side flap and prepare to exit. Sitting in the rear seat with the tail back attitude there is little to see, cannot imagine the pilots vision forward, which might explain the weaving on taxing to and in the take off. The Pilot warned of the smoke and s..t when the engine starts, he was right but what a thrill when that Merlin fired, the noise the vibration, the absolute thrill, nothing can express that moment, it has to be lived. A short taxi, bumping along the grass field to the end of the runway, where Marcia is waiting with our good friend Mark in the operation car, communication with the control tower, all communications are duplicated on the headphones, permission to go. The engine revs, the noise, vibration and acceleration, exhilaration in equal measure and we are away.

Once airborne the Pilot asked me if I had any where I wanted to go, Port of Portsmouth a home port for me, oh there is the Queen Elizabeth aircraft carrier – a Touch and Go (not a good idea) flying back along the shipping channel Brittany Ferries Bretagne and the Mont San Michel are about to pass but that Merlin was the attraction, all eyes are on the vintage fighter. Off to St Helens then onto Bembridge ledge along the beach to the delight of those on the sands. On to Selsey I am allowed to take the controls as the Pilots hands are waving in front of me, back in safe hands shall we try some acrobatics, a tentative yes, don't want to make a fool of myself with motion sickness, however the flying suit is equipped with a pocket and sickbag, too ,late a quick victory roll only one word WOW – Ok now a loop, the G force makes it difficult to lift hands off the lap, a barrel roll followed by another roll and all too soon its back off to Goodwood. As we approach Marcia and Mark are again at one end of the end of the runway, permission for low pass and at the other end of the runway and climbing again Pilot to passenger time for another quick victory roll don't you think. A Special Look Inside Dover's History



Can You Help?

We recently received an email from Michael Macmillan in New Zealand with a request for help in identifying some robes and mace.



This picture was inside an old leather bound family album brought out to New Zealand by family living in Kincardinshire. We believe they arrived in the 1880's. While residing around Laurencekirk the family also extended to Fordoun, Fettercairn, Benholm, Brechin and Montrose. Common family names included Fettes, Alexander, Peat and Milne.

The photo was initially thought to have depicted Sir William Fettes (Lord Provost of Edinburgh 1802 & 1804), however with his passing in 1836 this was not possible. No name or other details were on the back of the photo. The facial features however resemble other Fettes relatives.

We believe this photo was taken around 1860-1875 and I would like to learn more about the robes, mace and hopefully identify who the person is and when it was taken. Enquiries in Edinburgh and Dundee suggest the robes and mace do not originate from those cities.
