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A NEW JOURNAL

The Western Association for German Studies can now announce the publication of a scholarly journal, beginning in 1978. Subscription will be included at no increase in the regular annual dues. Published three times each year, the journal will carry articles (both in each discipline and interdisciplinary), news, and book reviews.

The Association has been able to secure financial assistance from Arizona State University and San José State University. The German Summer School of the University of New Mexico has joined us as a special institutional member. Additional institutional memberships in the Association will be helpful. We will also need library subscriptions, set at the special rate of \$20 per year. Members are encouraged to support the journal by obtaining library orders from their institutions.

The Executive Committee has appointed Prof. Gerald R. Kleinfeld of the Department of History at Arizona State University as Editor of the journal. Prof. Kleinfeld has submitted his resignation as Secretary-Treasurer of W.A.G.S., effective November 1, and the Committee will submit a nomination to the membership for a Secretary-Treasurer to succeed Prof. Kleinfeld. An Editorial Board, composed of established scholars in several disciplines of German studies, is being assembled. Members are asked to offer suggestions. It is hoped that the full board can be announced at our conference in October.

The journal will begin consideration of manuscripts November 1, 1977. Manuscripts may be in history, literature, political science, philosophy, other areas of German studies, or interdisciplinary. All manuscripts should be double-spaced on bond paper with end notes. A letter of inquiry prior to the submission of a manuscript is suggested, and should be addressed to

OTHER ASSOCIATION NEWS

First Annual Conference

Douglas Tobler, Program Director for the First Annual Conference, reports an excellent response to his solicitation of papers. The program is being assembled, and it now appears that sessions covering Germany, Austria, and Switzerland and involving subjects ranging from literature to history, music, and political science will be offered. Several interdisciplinary sessions will also be featured.

The program will be mailed to each member towards the end of the summer, along with hotel reservation forms and pre-registration information. Dates for the conference to be held in Phoenix, Arizona (Tempe and Glendale) are October 21-22.

Discussions in Bonn

David Kitterman and Gerald Kleinfeld will be travelling to Germany for research this summer, as are many other members of the Association. At the invitation of Prof. Hans-Adolf Jacobsen of the University of Bonn, Kitterman and Kleinfeld will meet with German officials to establish contact for our Association. Reece Kelly, Vice President, is taking his sabbatical in the Fall and will be available in the Federal Republic to continue such discussions.

Conference Group for German Politics

The CGGP sent Prof. Henry Brompton (Univ. of California -Northridge) as a representative to the January meeting of the Executive Committee of the W.A.G.S. The Executive Committee and Professor Brompton discussed the possibilities of each organization sponsoring a session at the other's conferences and other ideas for cooperation.

Western Social Science Association

The annual conference of the WSSA was held in Denver on April 21-23. W.A.G.S. participants included: James M. Erdmann (History- Univ. of Denver), discussant for the session on World War II in the Western Hemisphere: Diplomacy and the Cold War; Manfred Enssle (History - Colorado State Univ.), who read a paper on The Continuity of German Territorial Revisionism from Bethmann Hollweg to Brandt; George Kren (History - Kansas State University), who read a paper on Nazi Germany in Psychohistorical Perspective. The W.A.G.S. scheduled a no-host reception for members and friends to promote an exchange of views.

TWO CHAIRS OF AUSTRIAN STUDIES AT US UNIVERSITIES

The Austrian Committee on the US Bicentennial originally wanted to raise in Austria enough money to establish one chair of Austrian Studies at a major University in the USA. The interest of the Austrian people in buying the so-called "American Stars" was so overwhelming that a total of 12 million Austrian Schilling was collected. The Austrian government is matching these revenues with an equal amount, and the total sum of about 1.4 million Dollars makes it possible to establish two chairs of Austrian Studies instead of the only one originally planned.

The committee under the chairmanship of Federal Chancellor Dr. Bruno Kreisky has informed the US Ambassador to Austria that it has chosen the University of Minnesota and Stanford University. The University of Minnesota is planning a "Center of Austrian Studies" utilizing an inter-disciplinary approach. Stanford, which already has a "Stanford in Austria Program" intends to employ visiting professors from Austria.

SUMMER STUDY VISITS TO GERMANY AND AUSTRIA

Austria Summer Institute

The University of North Iowa will sponsor a Summer Institute in Austria for teachers of German June 21-August 16. It will be held at Klagenfurt, an Alpine city of 70,000 inhabitants. Language instruction will be accompanied by an integrated course in culture and civilization of modern Austria and Germany.

To qualify one must possess a Bachelor's Degree or its equivalent and must meet eligibility requirements for admission to graduate studies at the University of Northern Iowa. Successful completion of the regular program offers eight graduate credits and individual projects can possibly earn additional credit.

The comprehensive cost of the Institute is \$1150 plus the cost of the charter flight which was \$368 last summer. Those interested should contact: Dr. Fritz König, Director, 1977 Summer Institute in Austria, University of North Iowa, Cedar Falls, Iowa, 50613.

Summer Session in Trier, Germany

The Georgetown University School for Summer and Continuing Education will conduct a six week summer session at the facilities of the University of Trier. The program will offer intensive courses on several levels of the German language. Although no graduate courses will be taught in the 1977 Session, graduate credit can be earned by taking the two advanced upper level undergraduate courses offered and completing required additional work.

The cost for room, partial board (breakfast, noon-dinner, Monday-Friday), tuition, academic fees, and limited health insurance is \$640. This does not include incidental expenditures, travel between Paris and Trier or travel, room, and board prior to or after the end of the program. The round trip group flight from New York to Paris will be approximately \$359.

Marquette University Summer Session Language Center for Germany

1977 will be Marquette's fourteenth year in Germany. Marquette has established a nine week language program open to all undergraduate students of German who have had at least one year of college or two years of high school German. Elementary and secondary teachers of German may also participate by taking private reading courses for in-service credit.

The program schedule includes a tour of the Rhineland, three weeks of instruction in Berlin, three weeks at Hildesheim where students live with German families, a study tour of Southern Germany and Austria and time for individual travel.

Invitational Conference on U.S. Military Government in Germany and Japan, 1944-52.

The Smithsonian Institution's Dwight D. Eisenhower Institute for Historical Research and the American Committee on the History of the Second World War are conducting, in cooperation with the MacArthur Memorial and the Marshall Research libraries, an invitational conference on "Americans as Proconsuls: U.S. Military Government in Germany and Japan, 1944-52," at the National Museum of History and Technology in Washington, D.C., 20-21 May 1977. Its purpose is to provide a forum at which postwar occupation participants and scholars in the field may join in a systematic review of the history of the topic, as well as consideration of the directions future research may take. The program stresses discussion from the floor by invited participants. This discussion is to be recorded and edited for publication in the conference proceedings along with the panels and formal papers. Seminar on Austrian Economics

An instructional seminar in Austrian School economics sponsored by Liberty Fund of Indianapolis will be held at Mills College in Oakland, California from June 19 to July 2, 1977. It will be conducted by the Institute for Humane Studies, Inc. under the direction of Professor Charles W. Baird of California State University.

An intensive introduction to the economic theories of prominent Austrian School economists, particularly Menger and Bohm-Bawerk and later theorists such as Mises, Fetter, Hayek, and Lachmann will be the focus of the seminar. Comparative studies of Austrian and other schools of economic thought will also be included in the program.

Attendance will be limited to approximately thirty-five invited participants, with priority being given to graduate students and young college teachers who have not had an opportunity to study Austrian economics formally.

Fifth International Congress of Germanisten

The Fifth International Congress of Germanisten will take place in Dresden, DDR August 1-August 5, 1977. The conference, which expects to attract scholars from many countries, is being sponsored by the Internationalen Deutschlehrerverband with the cooperation of the Technische Universität, Dresden, and the Komitee für den Sprachunterricht in der Deutschen Demokratischen Republic. "Moderner Sprachunterricht - Lehrerbildung und Lehrerfortbildung" will be the theme of the Congress. The program will include numerous sections as well as "Arbeitsgruppen." Tours of Dresden and excursions to the Sächsisch Schweiz, Freiburg, and Meissen will also be available.

The Conference Group on German Politics is planning a conference to be held later this year in California on the role of the contemporary political novel in German politics. This is being organized by Prof. Henry Brompton (Cal-Northridge) and Prof. Wolfram Hanrieder (Univ. of Cal - Santa Barbara).

Akzente des Deutschen Historikertages 1976

Der 31. Deutsche Historikertag Ende September in Mannheim, von Geschichtswissenschaftlern und Geschichtslehrern gemeinsam veranstaltet, fand nicht nur wegen der hohen Teilnehmerzahl und der vielen ausländischen Gäste ein lebhaftes Echo, sondern auch deshalb, weil zum erstenmal seit Gründung des Historikerverbandes (1893) ein deutsches Staatsoberhaupt teilnahm und eine stark beachtete Rede hielt. Bundespräsident Walter Scheel plädierte für Toleranz gegenüber einer Vielfalt von Geschichtsbildern und Methoden der Geschichtsvermittlung. Er forderte diese Toleranz auch von den Lehrbüchern und vom Schulunterricht. Von der deutschen Frage als Geschichts- und Gegenwartsthema sprachen vor allem jüngere Historiker wie Hellmut Diwald, Würzburg, der ein Eingeständnis der tatsächlich unüberbrückbaren Teilung statt beschönigender und formaler Phrasen von der "Nation als Bezugspunkt" der Geschichte forderte, und

Siegfried Grassmann, neuer Vorsitzender des Verbandes der Geschichtslehrer, der dazu aufforderte, die sogenannte "deutsche Identität" schonungslos zu überdenken. Der scheidende Vorsitzende des Historikerverbandes, der Heidelberger Sozialhistoriker Werner Conze, zeichnete in seinem Vortrag über "Bedingungen und Ergebnisse der deutschen Geschichtswissenschaft seit 1945" ein positives Bild. Die westdeutsche Geschichtswissenschaft habe durch Aufnahme der sozio-ökonomischen Betrachtungsweise gewonnen; sie sei methodisch bewußter geworden. Sein Nachfolger, der Münchner Neuhistoriker Gerhard A. Ritter, forderte dazu auf, den Wandel in der Einstellung zur Geschichte in einen konkreten Gewinn für das Fach (etwa zur Förderung des heute blockierten Nachwuchses) umzumünzen. Lissy (1957)	88 minutes

This beautifully modulated film sheds some light on why the Jews fell into disfavor during the economic dislocations of pre-Nazi Germany. Based on a novel, it recounts the story of a woman who actually existed. Lissy worked at the cigarette counter of a bar in Berlin; though the daughter of a socialist, she was determined to escape her working class environment. She marries a man who appears to have security as an office worker, but as times grow harder, he loses his job. In desperation--and to the regret of Lissy--he turns to the Nazi Party for work, for status, and for retribution against those prominent in the crumbling business community, notably the Jews. By this time Lissy's brother has also become a Storm Trooper, a situation which leads to a final clash of values. Like The Shop on Main Street, this film focuses on the human dimensions of the Holocaust. Lissy is a somber, yet honest and thought-provoking drama about the rise of anti-Semitism, from Hitler's climb to power to the burning of the Reichstag.

Rotation (1949)

83 minutes

Rotation by Wolfgang Staudte (The Murderers Are Among Us) reflects a recurring theme of the 40's DEFA films; the inability of the German working class to recognize and thus prevent the impending dangers of fascism. The story unfolds over twenty years, ending with the fall of Berlin and the collapse of the Reich. Hans Behnke, the protagonist, is an essentially decent and non-political person inclined to take the path of least resistance. He is a hard-working printer whose life centers around his wife and child. When he finally decides to aid an anti-fascist group and unwittingly brings home some of their leaflets, he is betrayed to the Gestapo by his own son.

- TV2 Der Attentäter 90 minutes
 On November 8, 1939, a time-bomb explodes in the Bürgerbräu Keller in Munich. Contrary to his usual custom, Hitler, who was the target, had left eleven minutes earlier. The Gestapo identifies Georg Elser as the assassin. Stubbornly Elser denies having had any accomplices. Shortly before the end of the war, Elser is executed.
- TV4 Die Beichte 90 minutes
 An unknown elderly man confesses to the priest, Father Bernhard Weller, his gruesome past as a member of a liquidation group during the war, which also killed civilians in the East. Father Weller cannot grant the man absolution, but implores him to give himself up to the authorities. The man refuses and returns again and again seeking absolution. Father Weller turns him away one day. Shortly thereafter, a prominent business man is missing. Father Weller now faces the question: is this the man from his confession booth?
- TV7 Bauern, Bonzen und Bomben 438 minutes
 Egon Monk's TV adaptation of Fallada's famous novel on peasant demonstrations in a small North German town during the time between the two world wars. Through intervention of the police, the demonstration ends in bloodshed. This leads to a struggle until everyone is fighting everyone. The trial of the farmers' leaders results in the farmers boycotting all buying and selling of consumer goods. The events in and around the little town demonstrate the struggles of the Weimar Republic, which eventually delivers itself into the hands of its executioner.
